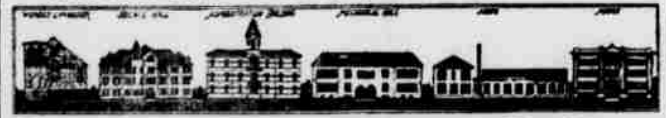

CANNERY MAKES PROFIT

Growers and Consumers Benefit by Prevention of Waste.

Roseburg, Ore., Sept. 6.—Employing 140 persons and with a payroll of \$2000 a week, the Umpqua Growers' association's cannery here is providing a market for thousands of dollars' worth of fruit that formerly went to waste in the orchards or was shipped to distant points at a distinct loss to growers.

The cannery was established last year under war-time conditions and 11 carloads of canned fruits and vegetables were shipped to distributors, most of the product going for army use. This season five carloads of fruit have been canned with a prospect of the plant doubling the output of 1918. Growers are receiving high prices for all sorts of garden and orchard products.

LIVE POULTRY IS MAILED

Shipment From Bend Country to Seattle Is Accepted.

Bend, Ore., Sept. 6.—The first shipment of poultry to pass through the Bend postoffice since the order of April 7, permitting such shipments, is a crate of five chickens sent from the M. Dobbertin ranch in the Powell Butte section to Seattle today.

The only other shipment of poultry ever made through the Bend office was three years ago, when fowls mailed at Silver Lake were allowed passage by the postal officials, although no rule covering the case existed at that time.

RAIN WORTH \$1,000,000.00

Bigger Apples and Better Crops Expected From Downpour.

Hood River, Ore., Sept. 6.—Yesterday morning orchardists were calling the local general precipitation a thousand dollar rain. Today they refer to it as the "million dollar rain." The rain has continued steadily since Thursday night, and up to noon today a total precipitation of 1.28 inches had been recorded by LeRoy Childs, superintendent of the Hood River experiment station.

The heavy precipitation, it is said, will result in greatly increased size of apples.

REDMOND USED AS BASE

Trucks From Supply Station Haul Gasoline to Bend.

Redmond, Ore., Sept. 6.—The Standard Oil Company for the past week has been furnishing Bend with gasoline from the large supply station at Redmond. The gas was hauled to Bend by motor truck, Redmond, the natural distributing point for a large territory both east and west, only recently has been recognized by the larger cities of central Oregon.

Redmond business and building are experiencing a healthy growth. The Redmond National Bank and a branch of the Tri-State Terminal company, a large grocery store, are two new concerns to open their doors for business here this year.

The First National Bank is constructing a new building and two or three other business houses contemplate new structures. Farmers are preparing to harvest the second crop of alfalfa, which is exceedingly good. The state has a crew of men constructing fish ladders at Steel Head and Cliffe falls, on the Deschutes river.
