Creamery Makes Phenomenal Growth.—Production Increases Over Last Year

The Morrow County Creamery Company is making a phenomenal growth. Manager W. Claude Cox is authority for the statement that the production of butter for nine months of 1919 has already exceeded the entire output of last year by 14,000 pounds. Very few new dairy herds are coming into the county, but the growth is due to the fact that more local shippers are sending their butterfat to the home creamery than formerly, and local dairymen are taking a keener interest in their industry and are continually building up their herds to greater production. The local creamery now receives daily cream shipments from every point on the local branch and a number of heavy shippers are listed among the dairy farmers of Boardman, Irrigon and Hermiston.

MARY A. WATTENBURGER

Mary A. Wattenburger died at the home of her son, J. C. Wattenburger of Portland, September 26, after an illness of 24 days.

Mary Ann Hatcher was born in Knoxville, Tennessee, May 25, 1837, being at the time of her death 82 years, 4 months and 1 day old. She was married in March, 1857, to Jacob H. Wattenburger. To their union 19 children were born; three of whom died in infancy, while Mary Ellen, wife of J. T. Ayers, died in Heppner, Ore., October 19, 1912.

The following children survive her: Eliza Pinkerton of Athena, W. J. Wattenburger of Echo; S. W. of Lake county, California; J. C. of Portland; A. E. and Mrs. E. O. Neill, both of Butter Creek. Besides these she leaves two sisters in Missouri, and 21 living grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

The deceased was a pioneer of Oregon, having crossed the plains in 1862 by an ox team. She was a member of the United Brethren church for many years.

The funeral was held from the First Christian Church in this city on Tuesday afternoon and burial was made in the Masonic cemetery. John T. Hoskins of Echo conducted the funeral services.

WHEN SAINTS ENTERED UTAH

July 24 Has Been Known as "Pioneer Day" Since the Founding of Salt Lake City.

Brigham Young, leading a company of Mormons numbering 147, of whom all, excepting two women and the same number of children, were men, entered Great Salt Lake valley and founded Utah at Salt Lake City, July 24, 1847. On the previous day the founder, reclining in Apostle Woodruff's carriage, sick with mountain fever, caught the first glimpse of the valley from the summit of the mountain.

"Enough," he said, "this is the right place; drive on."

Since this entry into the promised land the day has been called Pioneer day. Under the control and guidance of Brigham Young the work was begun that converted a wilderness, where it was predicted that not an ear of corn could grow, into one of the most fruitful garden places of the world. About three years after this the territory of Utah was organized, with Young as governor. Some feeling of ill-will grew up between the non-Mormon members of the government and the Mormons. Outside of Utah, opposition to Mormonism was greatly increased by Young's publication in 1852 of Smith's "revelation" on the eternity of the marriage covenant, including plurality of wives.

According to official estimates there are about 400,000 Latter Day Saints, mostly in Utah.

Rapid Heat Changes in Leaves.
Some recent investigations of the temperature of leaves made in the deserts and mountains of Arizona and in the Santa Lucia mountains of California have resulted in the discovery that leaves show a very rapid change of temperature at times. These fluctuations are almost constantly going on. Changes of from one to three degrees Centigrade were observed in from 20 to 60 seconds, and if a moderately strong wind is blowing the change may amount to five degrees in 30 seconds.
