COUNTY COURT HELD REGULAR SESSION

County Court met in regular session October 1, 1919. Present, Hon. Wm. T. Campbell, County Judge; E. L. Padberg, County Commissioner; E. M. Shutt, Sheriff; J. A. Waters, County Clerk.

When among others the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of the Road Petition of E. Bergstrom, et al, continued until the next regular term of the County Court.

In the matter of the Road Petition of W. R. Walpole, et al. Report of viewers approved and road ordered opened at expiration of 10 days, and same declared an established county road.

In the matter of the Road Petition of Merrill E. Doble, et al, for establishment of a county road, same read and viewers report approved and road declared an established county road at expiration of 10 days.

In the matter of the Road Petition of Geo. Mitchell, et al, for the establishment of a county road; same disallowed owing to irregular proceedings.

In the matter of Petition of Merrill E. Doble and others for Special Road meeting to vote an additional tax of 5 mills on the taxable property in Road Dist. No. 1, for the establishment of permanent roads; same was approved by County Court and Nov. 8 set as date for said meeting.

In the matter of the sale of lands owned by Morrow County. County Court made an order to sell lands at an upset price, being the lands acquired by Morrow County by tax title, and Monday, the 17th day of November set as date for said sale.

There being no further business Court adjourned for the term.

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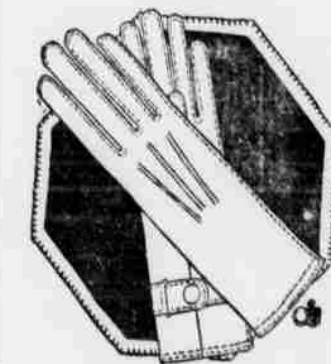
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
