Hens Laying Well Now
Good All-Year Layers

Condition of Comb and Abdomen. Color of Beak and Other Parts and men Show the Busy Bird.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 17.—"College records show that the hen that lays well through September and October is the hen that generally lays well the rest of the year," said James Dryden, chief of poultry husbandry at the college. "The records also show that the medium and poor layers through these two fall months are the medium and poor layers through the year."

A method of picking out the good layers has been developed by the experiment stations and explained for the benefit of growers. By applying the method in the two months named poultrymen can select the layers at that time, which will generally prove to be the good layers for the year.

The late moulter is generally the non-layer. Other indications of the layer are amount of yellow color in the beak, shanks, ear lobes and vent, and the condition of the comb and abdomen.

Hens of the yellow skin breeds that show much yellow in the parts named are not laying, or the color would have been used up in the manufacture of the yolks. In layers these parts are pale.

The combs of the layers are medium to large for the breed, red, soft and warm to the touch.

The abdomen of the laying hen is rather wide, deep and flexible, with thin, well-spread pelvic bones and good distance between the pelvic and the keel bones.

"It costs about \$3 a year to feed a hen now," said Professor Dryden, "and poultrymen must cull out the poor layers or go broke."

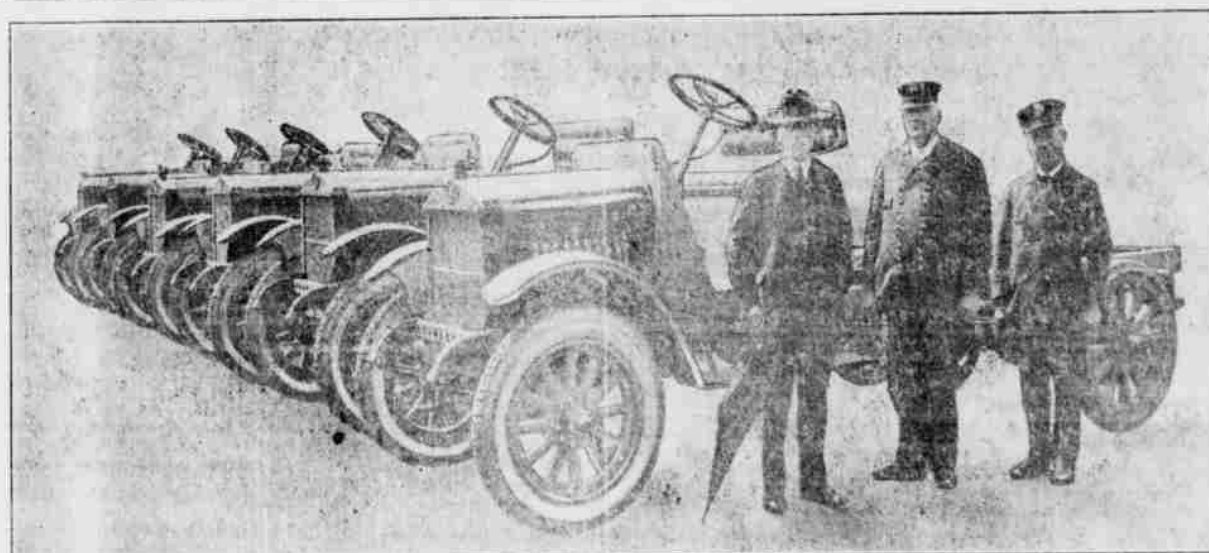
