"We may just as well definitely face the fact that no man can ever be a good American, no man can ever be a really first-class citizen of the United States, unless he is an American and nothing else. Recent events have shown us that the effort to combine loyalty to this land with loyalty to any other can only result in weakening the loyalty to this country. Washington and Lincoln were of English descent, but they were not English-Americans. Their loyalty was undividedly and wholeheartedly to the United States and to all of the people of the United States in every part thereof. In international relations they judged England precisely as they judged all other nations; that is, in any given crisis they judged every foreign nation exactly in accordance with its conduct in that crisis; they were as incapable of the meanness of unreasoning malice and hatred toward any particular nation as of meanness of truckling to it and making its interests superior to our own. They set the standard of Americanism which all of our citizens should follow in their relations with one another, in their attitude toward their own country, and in their attitude toward each and all foreign nations."

DISTRIBUTION OF
GOVERNMENT SEEDS

Any young man, who is a bona fide resident of the Second Oregon District, desiring to enter this competition, should write at once to Congressman Sinnott, Room 347, House of Representatives for further particulars regarding the examination. The ages of admission to West Point are 17 to 22 years and to Annapolis 16 to 20 years.

THE MOVIE—ITS EDUCATIONAL FEATURES.

We believe the movie shows of today are improving over the movie shows of yesterday. Better methods of photography make for brighter and better pictures, but aside from the mechanical-scientific improvements, the moral tone of the films are on a higher plane.

And its all coming about through education.

At first the movie fan was entertained and amused by most anything that was flashed on the screen, for in the days of its youth, the screen produced a novelty that was in itself, attraction.

But now the movie does more than amuse and entertain. It instructs. It tells stories in more and interesting fashion than any writer, for it pictures them to the eye. It teaches geography, history in the making, and brings the four corners of the world to one's own neighborhood.

All these things often pass before our eyes of one evening as the films flicker. We see the mountain peaks

without bending beneath the burden of climbing the mountain side. We see far off rivers, lakes, forests, flowers, wild animals of the jungles, curious birds of distant lands, the Eskimo in his Arctic ice hut and the little-clothed dweller of the tropics. At the movies we sail over vast oceans of water, "take off" on the wings of motored birds, and think nothing of combing the floors of the seas.

We see wars fought thousands of miles away, and we see wonderful feats of engineering skill. We meet the world's celebrities face to face at the movie.

And our wife and daughter, too, are instructed. The movie to them is a school in which they are instructed

in the things pertaining to fashion, new and charming methods of making even a time-worn home look altogether different and more inviting. However, the movie doesn't set itself forth as a teacher. It would fail of its purpose if it did that. Rather does it cloak its lessons beneath the tempting tinsel of entertainment, and that is just why its lessons sink deeply into the film-entranced brain.

Most of us go away from the motion picture show knowing a bit more about the world. This is knowledge and to acquire knowledge the human brain must study, consciously or unconsciously, in schoolroom, kitchen, field or elsewhere.

The movie is truly one of America's great institutions.
