

ARE HEPPNER CHILDREN GETTING MILK IN THEIR DIET?

Jana S. Sherris, county superintendent, city superintendent, the principal and the teachers of the local schools of Heppner have been asked to cooperate in making a milk survey to ascertain how many children are getting milk in their diet. The work is simple but it is regarded as important in that it calls attention to the great food value of milk and dairy products. The plan is that of the Oregon Dairy Council, an educational organization that has the cooperation of the Oregon state agricultural college and the endorsement of the bureau of health, the state superintendent of schools, the Oregon Parent-Teacher associations and the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, the State Chamber of Commerce and other organizations and persons of prominence.

In Portland it was found that there were 5702 children under 14 years of age who were getting no milk in their diet. Follow up work teaching the food value of dairy products, lectures at meetings and talks by the teachers, all voluntarily done, increased the use and raised the health standard wonderfully. The returns of the milk survey will be sent by the principals to the dairy council's educational director, Edith Knight Hill, 807 Broadway Building, Portland, who will compile them.
