

Morrow County Men Are Called As Witnesses

A number of Morrow county men have been subpoenaed as witnesses in the case of the State of Oregon versus Cedric Scharff, which is now being tried before the Grant county circuit court at Canyon City. Dr. A. D. McMurdo and Harold Cohn of Heppner and G. A. Bleakman and Dr. Hayden of Hardman left on Saturday for Canyon. Dr. Harold Bean of this city, who has been called to give expert testimony, left the middle of the week.

Young Scharff has been indicted for second degree murder, in connection with the death of Martin Leslie, age 14 years. Scharff fired at Leslie with a .38-36 rifle when the latter was in Scharff's wagon parked near Monument. The bullet struck the boy in the leg and he later died from his injuries at Condon, where he was taken for medical treatment.

Lawson Sells Farm And Will Live In Heppner

Norman F. Lawson has sold his Rhea creek farm near Jordan Siding to Jeff Beamer of Heppner and Mr. Beamer has already taken possession of his new property. In the deal, Mr. Lawson takes over Mr. Beamer's interest in the Heppner Delivery Company and will make his home in this city. Mr. Beamer has been in the delivery business for a number of years and has made a financial success of his endeavors. The ranch which he has bought is considered one of the best creek ranches on Rhea creek. Mr. Lawson bought the ranch over a year ago from Glenn Boyer for about \$18,000. The Lawson-Beamer deal was handled by E. M. Shutt, local real estate dealer.

1920 Census Takers Are In Great Demand Here

Census takers for the 1920 count are in great demand in this county, according to Postmaster W. A. Richardson, who says as yet that he has received no applications from would-be enumerators.

The enumeration will start on the 2nd of January, 1920 and will last approximately the entire month. The pay will be about \$6 per day with some provisions made for traveling expenses. Women are as eligible as men and Postmaster Richardson is ready and waiting to receive applications. The sooner the applications are in the sooner they will be acted upon.

There will be two enumerators from the Heppner districts and another for the Lena, Gentry and Pine City precincts.

Federal Aid of \$250,000,000 Asked For Reclamation

The Western States' Association has been organized as a result of the Conference held November 21st and 22nd at Salt Lake City. Representatives from thirteen of the reclamation states were present at the Conference, which was called for the purpose of crystallizing sentiment in the Western States in favor of some definite plan of furthering Federal reclamation. The Association decided to request of Congress an appropriation of \$250,000,000 to replenish the reclamation fund. Provision was made for an executive committee composed of one member from each State to carry out the recommendations of the association. State Engineer Percy A. Cupper was selected as executive committee member from Oregon.

The first meeting of the executive committee was held in Salt Lake City following the Conference, and it is proposed to hold the next meeting in Washington, D. C., soon after the convening of Congress.

It is proposed to raise the necessary funds for carrying on the campaign by voluntary subscription. Oregon's allotment is \$3,000. The importance of this movement to Oregon can hardly be overestimated. Any substantial addition to the U. S. Reclamation fund will not only permit of additional construction work by the Reclamation Service, but will also greatly stimulate irrigation under the irrigation district plan, which is proving so successful in Oregon. It is believed that the movement will receive the support of

every irrigation and drainage enterprise in the State, on account of its far reaching effect. Even though a project may not be in a position to directly receive federal aid, the fact that the Reclamation Service is in the field will make it much easier for such projects to secure the necessary finances from private sources. We are undoubtedly entering upon an era of unprecedented development along the lines of irrigation and drainage, and by putting up a

united front will now have an opportunity of greatly advancing the case.

It seems that an opportunity is now being presented whereby Oregon may be able to secure her full share of federal development, particularly if the irrigation interests give wholehearted support to the movement initiated by the Western States' Reclamation Association at the Salt Lake City Conference.

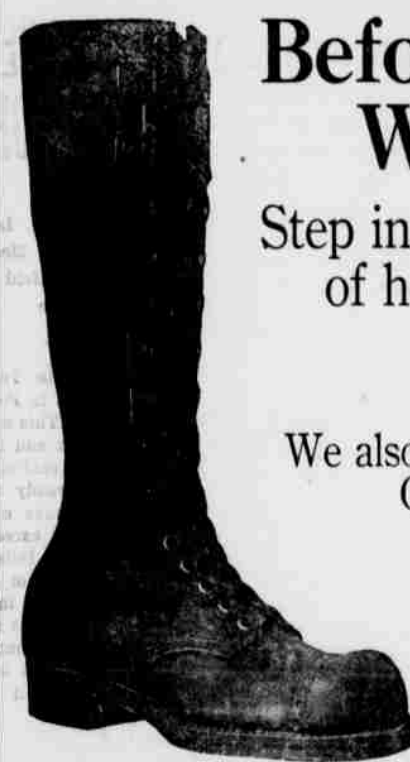

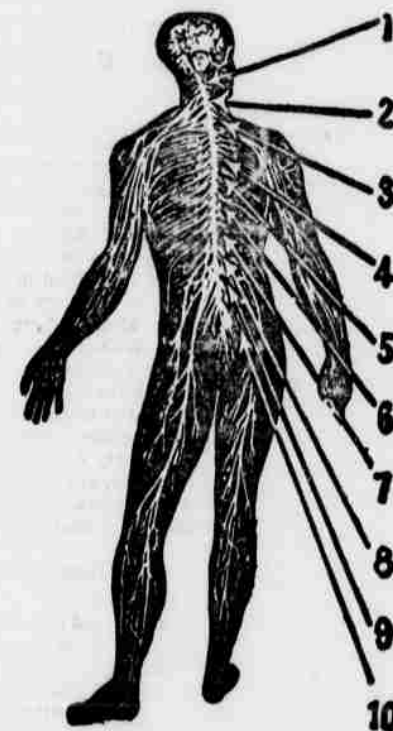
