RANCHERS CHANGE HANDS

E. M. Shutt reports the sale through his agency the past ten days of the following pieces of real estate in Morrow county:

Mr. Ewing P. Berry, a Lexington farmer, has bought what is known as the old Wm. Hughes wheat and stock ranch, lying just a mile and a quarter South of Heppner city limits, consisting of 1057 acres, at a consideration of \$26,425. The former owner was H. Taylor Hill, of Monmouth. This large farm contains about 500 acres of good wheat land and the remainder good pasture land, well watered and conveniently located for a desirable home. Mr. Berry and family will move onto the place next spring, and Mr. Alex Green, the present tenant, will also occupy a part of the premises until he reaps his 1920 crop of grain.

As stated in our last issue, N. F. Lawson has sold his 250-acre alfalfa and wheat farm lying near the mouth of Rhea creek, to Jeff Beamer, of this city, the consideration being \$19,500. As part of the consideration Mr. Lawson takes over the Beamer property in and adjoining the Heppner city limits, consisting of some 100 acres, also Mr. Beamer's delivery business, at a to-beamer, who has had previous experience in the dairy business, we understand, will stock his new ranch with good Jersey cows, and with butter fat selling around about 70 cents per pound, and with his surplus hay selling at over \$20 per ton, Jeff ought to get in on a large share of the prosperity that the new highway will bring to the Willow Creek basin.

Heppner Monday, coming over with his truck after a load of ranch supplies. Mr. Hayes reports considerable snow in his neighborhood.

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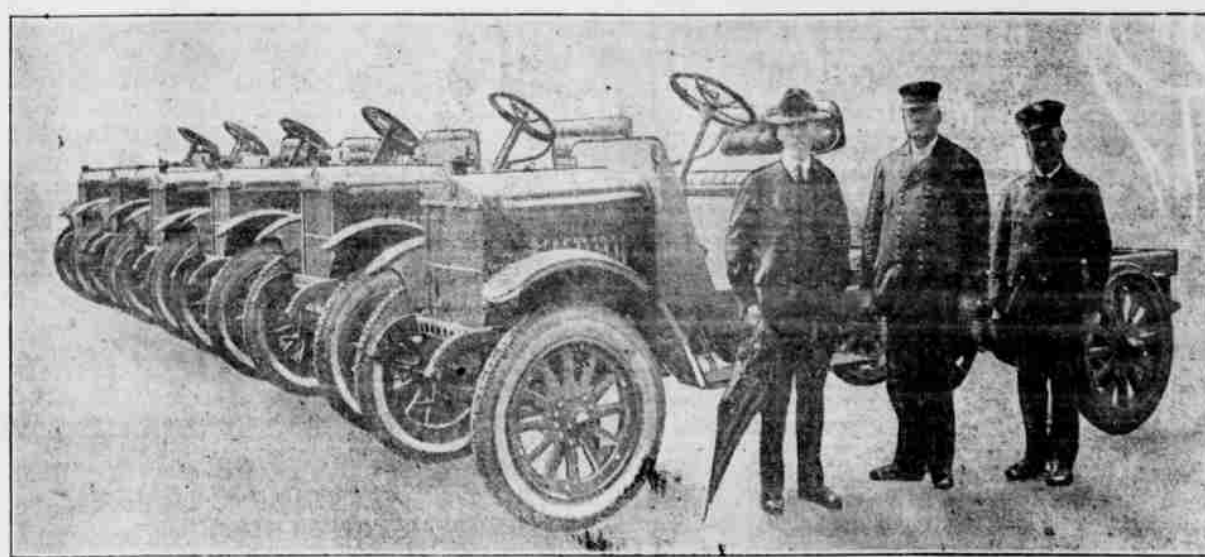
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
