Christmas, with all the term implies as to universal fellowship, bounteous unselfishness and renewed recognition of the fact that to give is actually better than to receive.

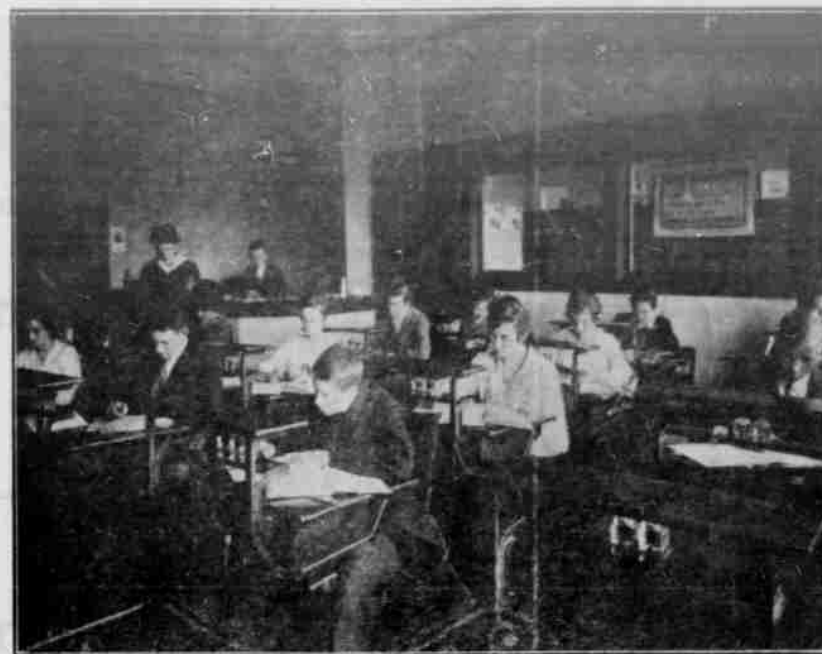

The Heppner Public School System is well organized and is doing as good if not better work than any system its size in the state. A survey of the school was made last year under the direction of the University of Oregon. It brought out many facts about the condition of the school and the weak places are being brought up to standard. The standard tests will be given again this year to determine if there is an improvement in the grade of work done. There has been an increase in the enrollment and the building is now crowded and has made it necessary to put one grade room in the high school section and the music room in the basement. At the present time there are many outside pupils attending in high school. There are 44 in the Freshman class with an enrollment in high school of 100.

There is a great need for better facilities for play during the cold weather and a better gymnasium. The old fair building is too far from the school to successfully handle the athletics.

The first graduating class from the four courses was in 1911. Today there are 83 graduates. The 1911 class numbered 8 students. The 1919 class numbered 23 students. Of the total number of graduates 30 have attended higher institutions of learning; 8 have been graduated and 9 are now attending colleges or Universities.

Seaside Votes for Scenic Highway
SEASIDE.—By a vote of 274 to 20, Seaside has gone on record as favoring the \$253,000 bond issue for the construction of a scenic drive, 55 feet in width. The road will run parallel with the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Rd. from Wahanna to Broadway and south to the city limits, a distance of one and a half miles.
