WOOL AUCTIONS INJURIOUS TO OUR MARKETS

It is the belief of the Western Wool growers that the government is not only losing money for itself but seriously injuring the wool market of the United States by continuing its public auctions of its surplus holdings of wool.

The last few auctions in the east indicated that there is no demand at this time for the quality of wool that the government has to sell, according to Dr. S. W. McClure of the Cunningham Sheep & Land Co., who as acting secretary of the National Wool Growers association wired the quartermaster general of the United States army at Washington the following message:

Quartermaster General,
U. S. Army, Washington, D. C.

The recent auctions of Government owned wool indicate that the demands of our markets for wools of these grades are fully satisfied and to offer more of these wools at auction in this country at this time means a large sacrifice of money to our government and results in demoralizing the market of American

grown wools, a years' supply of which we will offer on the market in the next few weeks.

On behalf of the entire American wool industry, we ask that no more Government owned wool be sold in this country until December first and as there is a demand for wools of these grades in Europe, we suggest that they be sold there.

"Mr. McClure's suggestion that the remaining wool, which is much picked over and as a consequence, of inferior quality, should be sold in Europe, Germany and Belgium, as well as many of the other European countries are in need of just this material, he says, and the government would not only make the money for itself but would cease to endanger the domestic market by offering its holdings for export instead of by auction in this country.

The Arizona growers are already shearing and their clips will be on the market now; local shepherds will be offering their 1920 clips within 29 to 60 days and the members of the association believe that the government should take cognizance of this fact in disposing of the remainder of its holdings.

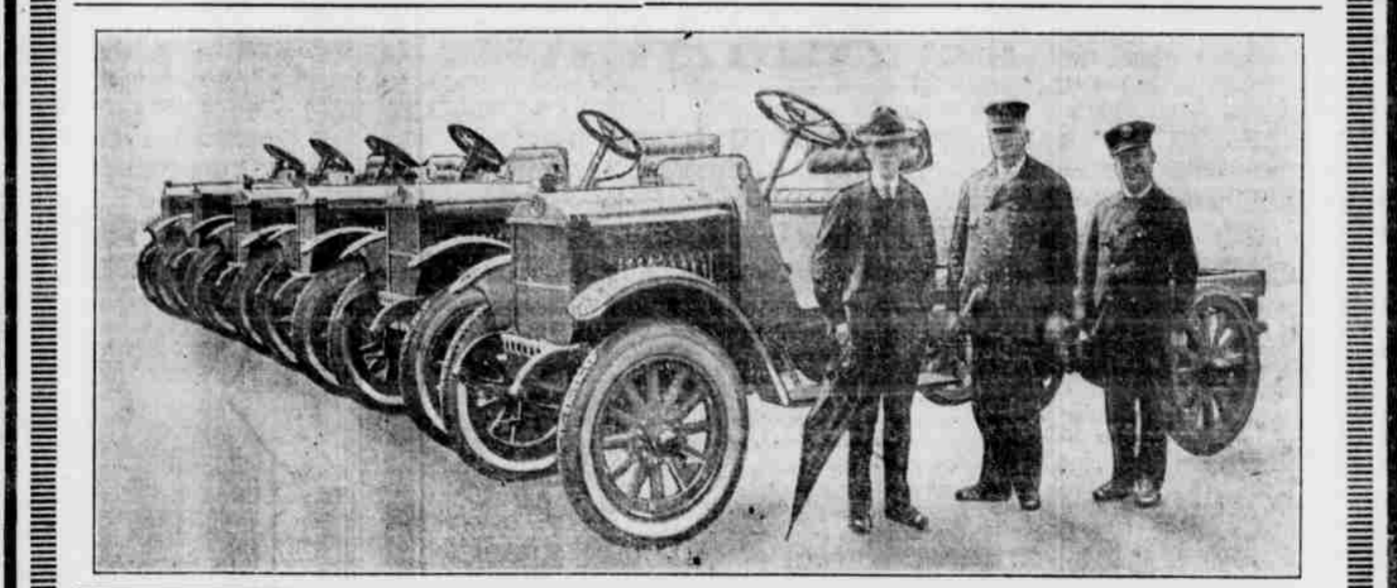
