

Special Road Committee

Passes Resolutions

There was a meeting of the special farm bureau road committee at the court house on Tuesday, and passed the following resolutions:

1st. Moved by W. H. Stewart and duly seconded that the north Morrow county road committee ask the County Court of Morrow county to secure a reconnaissance survey for a market road from a point upon the Columbia River Highway between Boardman and Irregon to Heppner by way of Lexington, taking into consideration the interests of the neighborhoods of Alpine, Irregon, Boardman, Wells Springs and Lexington, and that this survey be made before Jan. 1st, 1921.

2nd. Moved by Amos Straight and seconded by W. H. Stewart that this committee request the County Court to appropriate the market road money for 1921 upon the road above designated, beginning at or near Lexington and constructing the road as far as the funds will permit.

3rd. Moved by Amos Straight and seconded by C. E. Glasgow that this committee does agree to remain intact for the purposes of its appointment, and hereby tenders its services to the County Court to assist in working out any road problems in the northern part of Morrow county.

SILAGE IS EXCELLENT FEED

FAVOR RAISING FALL CALVES

Expert of South Dakota College Gives Reasons Why Farmers Will Find It Profitable.

Several reasons why farmers find it more profitable to raise fall calves are given as follows by Prof. C. Larson of South Dakota State college:

A cow that freshens in the fall will produce about 20 per cent more milk during the year than one that calves in the spring.

take the place of the 18 bulls formerly maintained. The reduction in the number of bulls also resulted in a corresponding reduction in the cost of maintenance to be charged to each cow.

The improvement in the quality of the bulls seemed to have a marked effect on the class of cows kept in the herd, and in less than one year after the association was formed the number of purebred females in the community increased from two in July, 1918, to 42 the following June.

The large amount of good which resulted from the transformation of a scrub-bull community into a community of good purebred sires is an agricultural improvement hard to parallel, especially when it is considered that this change was made with an expenditure of only \$10 more per farmer, and that the use of good sires will result in a lasting improvement to dairy cattle of the community.
