

FARM POINTERS THAT POINT TO SUCCESS

Day-to-Day Hints on Big and Little Items of Programs, by O. A. C. Specialists.

Poultry: Eggs that have been in the incubator or under setting hens and test as infertile should be made use of—is the advice of the poultry department of the college. The infertile eggs should be boiled and mixed with bread crumbs or bran and meal.

If plenty of milk is available keep it before the chicks at all times. No water need be given them and they will drink enough of the milk to satisfy thirst as well as make a satisfactory growth, reports the college poultry authorities.

Dairy: Bulls from high producing cows insure a future herd that will give greater returns for feed and labor. Plan now for such a bull to head your herd, advises the dairy specialist of the college.

Farm Management: How much you will be able to pay for irrigation water is a question that can only be determined by keeping farm records and accounts. The farm management department of the college advises the use of the farm record book which may be obtained from your county agent or bank.

Blind Want Opportunity To Be Self Supporting

"Give the blind of Oregon an opportunity to be self-supporting," is the plea of the committee working in behalf of approval of the legislative bill to be voted on at the state election May 21, providing for a tax levy of one sixth of a mill to erect and equip an industrial employment institution in the State of Oregon for the benefit of Oregon's blind.

"A great number of the blind of Oregon," says Oscar W. Horne, secretary of the citizens' committee, "are now almost wholly dependent upon charity. With the problem increased by the return of soldiers who have been rendered sightless, the majority of states have awakened to the duty of providing some means whereby the blind can be taught useful trades and become self supporting."

"The voters are asked to give but a trifling amount and none should hesitate in voting favorably on this bill. Campaign funds are not available and a committee interested in aiding the blind is seeking cooperation of all organizations in presenting the merits of the bill to the public from all over the state."

The bill will be before the voters at the primary election May 21, having been referred to the voters by the Legislature. It provides for one sixth of a mill for establishing and equipping the institution and an annual levy of one twenty-fifth of a mill for maintenance.

The Farm Bureau Spray Campaign

Under the direction of our County Farm Bureau orchardman a great many trees have been sprayed around Heppner, but the fact of the matter is, we miscalculated. We thought that one spraying outfit in charge of two men would be able to cover more ground than they have been able to so far. We have been handicapped in several ways. In the first place the weather, storms and wind, have delayed the game very materially and at various times we have been held up because of railway difficulties in securing a proper supply of spraying material. However, a great many trees have been sprayed and the work is still continuing. With the experience this year, another year we would have to have at least one more spray wagon in order to properly accommodate the orchards, which there are around here, and get over the ground within a reasonable time. If you have an orchard that has or has not been sprayed, give this matter your consideration. What do you think should be done about buying another spray wagon?

Hardman Livestock Association Takes Definite Action

At a meeting of the Hardman Livestock Association called early in April, which was attended by representatives of the forestry department, and the County Agent, definite plans were made for purchasing registered bulls for the entire association this fall. During the season a list of available animals will be secured so that with as little difficulty and expense as possible, these animals may be distributed among the various members of the association. It was further decided that all animals going onto the Forest Reserve, two years of age and under, should be vaccinated. Every farmer was left to provide the proper black-leg vaccine, however, most of the farmers pooled their orders together, and altogether the Farm Bureau has shipped in nearly one thousand doses of vaccine at a saving of at least \$40 to the farmers of the county.
