FRAUD IN LAND DEAL CHARGED BY WOMAN; ASKS TO HAVE OPTION VOIDED

Trade of Morrow County Wheat Land for Umatilla County Property Would Have Meant Loss of \$65,000 Say Plaintiffs.

The option given by Olive Lee and Viola Savage to O. T. Lathrop on a trade in Umatilla County wheat land for wheat land in Morrow county is asked set aside in a suit filed in circuit court today, charging the defendant and his agents, E. C. Lloyd and R. C. Lashley, with deceitful, fraudulent and mendacious dealing. The plaintiffs allege that they gave the option on their land worth \$92,000, for land which they afterward discovered is worth but \$26,420.

The plaintiffs, according to their complaint, stood to lose \$65,580 if the deal went through. They allege that the Morrow county land was represented to them as being worth \$10 an acre and would produce between 25 and 30 bushels of wheat an acre. There are 2300 acres in the tract, 1100 acres of which, the defendant is alleged to have represented, is irrigated. Later the plaintiffs learned, they aver, that the land was on the market at \$20 an acre and considered worth not more than that.

The plaintiffs gave an option on the deal, which they asked the defendant to cancel when they learned the alleged true value of the land offered, the complaint says. The defendant has refused to cancel the option and has had it recorded in Umatilla county, the plaintiffs say.

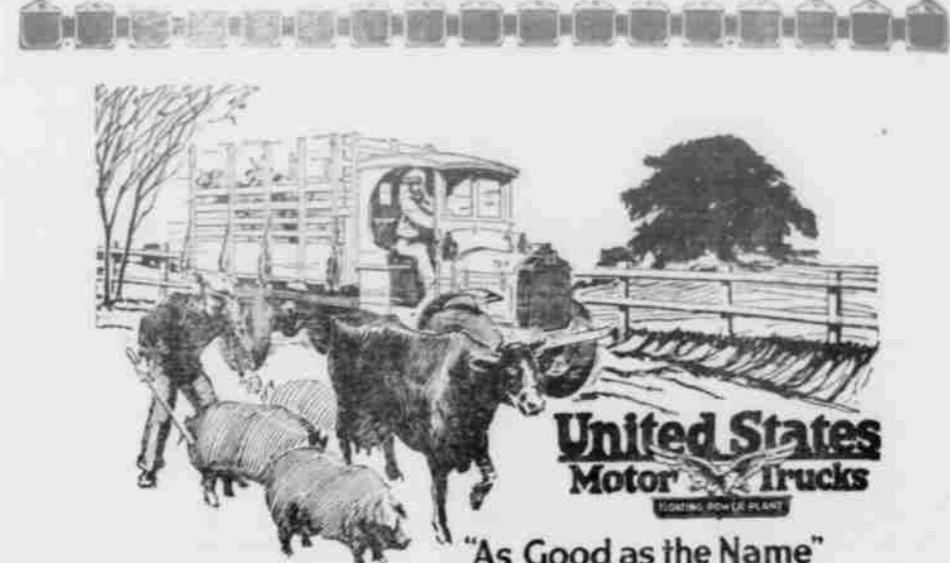

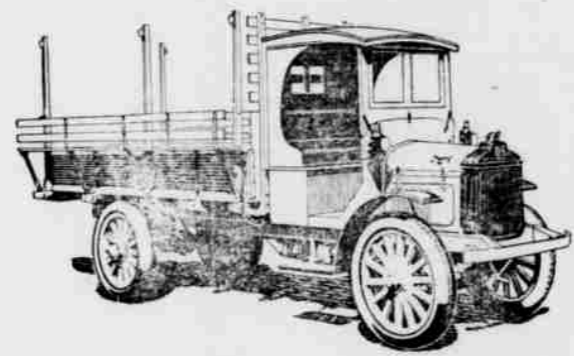
