**Best Meeting of Cattle Raisers Held at Burns**

The cattle and horse raisers of Oregon held their seventh annual convention in the center of the cattle country of Southeastern Oregon, at Burns, and report the best meeting ever held.

Many questions of great importance were discussed, and among them were the proposed increase in grazing rates and the position of the U. S. Department upon the limiting of the number of cattle allowed in the reserve to each owner. General Supervisor Kavanaugh of Portland appeared for the department.

Prof. Potter of O. A. C. and Robt. Withycombe of the Union Experiment station gave some excellent figures upon production costs. Several cattlemen spoke upon the future of the beef industry and the heavy losses incurred because of the instability of the market. Everyone agreeing that the herds must be reduced for the future.

Cooperative marketing discussion was opened by L. A. Hunt and participated in by several large cattle

owners. The convention went on record as favoring some of the plans of cooperative marketing for the Northwest, and appointed a committee to draw up plans and details for the same.

The hospitality of Burns was thoroughly appreciated by all, and the invitation of Canyon City to meet with them next year was accepted.

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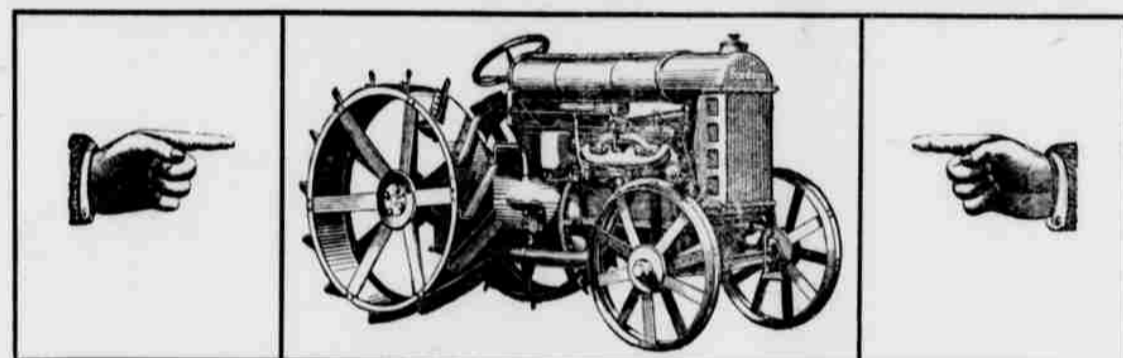

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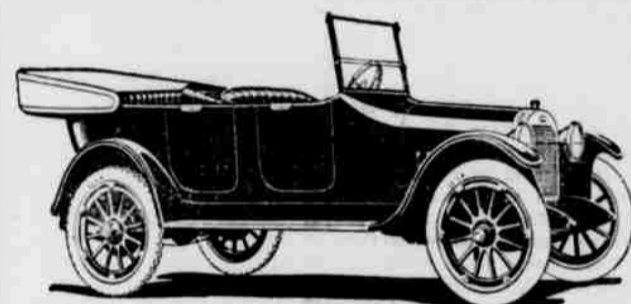

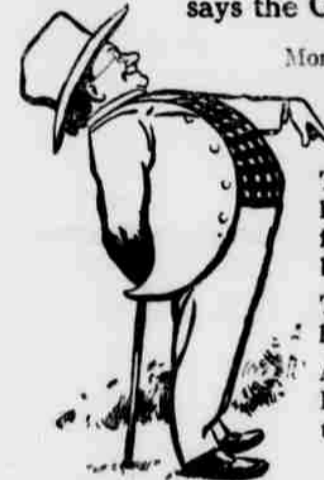
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
