

TEACHERS' COURSES FOR SUMMER SCHOOL

Annual Educational Conference Will Bring Experts to University for Opening Week.

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 31.—The courses to be offered during summer school at the University of Oregon, in Eugene, have been specially planned for teachers and those desiring to do graduate work, according to Dr. H. D. Sheldon, dean. Several prominent educators from other states, as well as some of the best instructors in Oregon, have been secured, he declares. Dr. Edgar Dawson, of Hunte College, New York, will offer a teachers' course in "Problems in the Teaching of Civics." Dr. Harry E. Barnes, of the New School for Social Research, New York, will give "Problems in Social and Political Adjustment since the Great War." Both Dr. Dawson and Dr. Barnes will give assembly lectures. Miss Anna Fox, instructor in playground courses and pageants, Donagan Hall, New York, will give work in the more specialized forms of physical education, including esthetic dancing, and festivals and pageants.

Work is offered in every regular department of the university, and some special courses have been arranged with the needs of teachers in mind. School starts June 21 and ends July 30. No entrance requirements are made unless the work is taken for credit.

The annual educational conference, which always takes place the first week of summer school, will be held in Guild Hall, June 25 and 26. Leaders of educational opinion will be present as guests and will take part in the programs. Round table discussions will be featured. Some of the subjects taken up will be problems in adjusting schools to teacher shortage, vocational guidance, continuation schools, surveys and efficiency standards, and moral education.

Codling Moth Busy—Spray.

Codling moths, hastened by the hot days of early June, are emerging in large numbers in various districts of Oregon, and are busy depositing eggs for the next worm crop, reports A. L. Lovett, entomologist of the O. A. C. experiment station. The eggs will begin hatching in 10 days from time of laying, and to control the worm brood the 30-day spray should be put on three days ahead of their arrival. In the Willamette district this calls for the application starting Monday, June 7. This spray is made of one pound dry lead arsenate to 50 gallons of water. If scab is present lime-sulfur solution, summer strength, may be used instead of the water with one pound dry lead arsenate. The solution is applied to young fruit and foliage so completely that the first meal of the young worm will prove to be his last.

Hood River Strawberry Crop Late.

Hood River—Because of the long continued cold weather through May, the mid-Columbia strawberry crop has ripened far slower than in normal years. The tardy harvest season has produced a large number of unemployed transient pickers.

STATE CHAMBER WILL PUT OVER BIG PROGRAM

Chamber of Commerce Expansion Movement

With practically every community in Oregon organized the intensive canvass throughout the state in the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce expansion movement will begin June 14th. The canvass will continue until August 1st.

The educational work in connection with the expansion movement, which began several weeks ago, will continue during June and July.

Twelve men, composing six teams of two men each, will direct the intensive organization work simultaneously in six different sections of the state. They will be assisted by eighty community executive committees appointed during the state-wide survey conducted preliminary to the intensive organization work.

Leading men in every section of Oregon are affiliated with the State Chamber in the capacity of committee chairmen and members in the movement to raise a budget of \$450,000 (\$150,000 a year) covering a three year period with which to carry on the development work of the State Chamber. More than two hundred endorsements have been received from those men approving the expansion movement and citing the need for such an agency as the State Chamber to take the initiative in development problems affecting the entire state.

Codling Moth Here.

Oregon apple growers are notified by the college entomologist that the codling moth emerged early in June and the 30-day spray should be put on as soon after June 7 as possible. Use dry lead arsenate, 1 lb. to 50 gallons of water, or to 50 gallons lime-sulfur if scab is present.
