RAFFLE OF PUREBRED CALVES

Novel Idea Introduced in Wisconsin County to Promote the Cause of Better Sires.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

A novel form of raffle has been employed in Lincoln county, Wisconsin, by the members of a newly organized Holstein cattle association to promote the cause of better sires. With the profit the association derived from the sale of 32 head of cattle which it brought in from the southern part of the state, and from the sale of several other animals secured locally. the association bought eight purebred bull calves. The method by which these calves were distributed resembled a raffle. However, no fee was exall were required to join the association. In every instance the bull went to men who had not had purebred bulls previously or who had manifested little interest in the purebred stock
