## STATE NEWS

### Plex Company Expands.

Salem—Unprecedented increase in business during the past few months is given as the reason for the increase in the capital stock of the Plex company of this city from \$1,500,000 to \$4,000,000.

Members of the firm said that an order for 15,000 cases of jams and jellies had been received by the company from South Carolina, and that by June 1, the sales would be approximately three times as large as on the same date a year ago. Although there will be a general expansion in the business of the corporation, no new buildings will be constructed until financial conditions return to normal.

### Western Wool Men Will Meet in Chicago.

Western bankers and sheepmen have been asked to meet at Chicago on June 17 to consider means for reestablishing a market for wool and for giving financial aid to the producers. The meeting was suggested by Governor Harding of the Federal Reserve Board. The conference, Governor Harding suggested, should be "with the view of working out some plan which would restore confidence and reestablish the market for wool and meantime provide producers with the means of carrying their wool while it is awaiting market."

### Bend Population Grows 916 Per Cent.

Census figures just given out at Washington show that Bend, the metropolis of Central Oregon now has a population of 2,414 people, or an increase over the 1910 census of 916 per cent. Ten years ago Bend was a village with 236 people. The town

made its rapid growth through the pine milling industry and the progress of Bend really started in 1916 when two large mills, the Brooks-Scanlon and Shevlin-Hixon mills, employing 1800 men, were established there.

Prominent homes of Pendleton will be thrown open for the accommodation of teachers who will attend the Eastern Oregon Summer school session in that city.

Asa H. Thompson, mayor of Echo, shot and killed W. H. Smith when Smith resisted arrest on a charge of assault with intent to rob. Smith fired two shots point blank at Thompson before he was killed. It is believed that the slain man had become temporarily deranged mentally. The shooting was the aftermath of Smith's attempt to extort money from Joe Hanson at the point of a gun. Thompson was exonerated from all blame after a two hours deliberation by the jury.

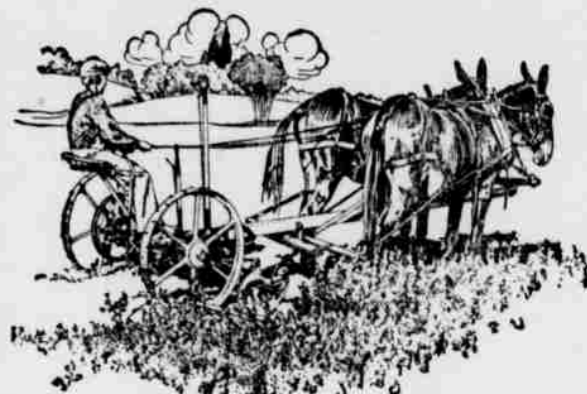
