

State Farm Bureau Begins Action.

Chas. Kestley of the Morrow County Farm Bureau, attended the first meeting of Eastern Oregon Farm Bureau Presidents which was called in LaGrande to consider the organization of a state Farm Bureau.

The Western Oregon County Farm Bureau Presidents met in Corvallis on Saturday, September 4th.

Mr. Kestley reports a first class meeting and the sentiment of the Eastern Oregon Farm Bureau Presidents is strongly in favor of a State Farm Bureau with a live secretary. The counties represented at this meeting were: Wasco, Sherman, Morrow, Deschutes, Wallowa, Union, Malheur, Baker and Umatilla. A committee of three was appointed to meet with a like committee appointed from the Corvallis conference, and these committees will meet in Portland and fix the time and arrange the plans for the state-wide Farm Bureau meeting at which it is expected that a large number of Morrow county people will attend. It is hoped that this meeting will be held sometime in October so that before the winter season sets in the Farm Bureau can get down to definite work.

Chas. Irwin Reports on Harrowing Grain.

Chas. Irwin, of Ione, who was in town Saturday, reports that last fall when he finished seeding his grain, and after the grain had sprouted a half an inch, some sprouts showing almost through the ground, he started to harrow the grain with three harrows but was prevented from finishing because of the early freezing of the field. This left about forty acres in the middle of the field unharrowed. This forty acres was decidedly weedy and gave but a very poor yield as compared with that which he was able to harrow after seeding and at a time when he had a chance to kill the weeds. He says that the grain he harrowed this spring did not

give as good a yield as that which he did not harrow at all, which he attributes to the fact that the grain harrowed was set back and delayed in ripening so that the hot weather caught it and caused it to shrivel much worse than that which was not harrowed.

A. W. Cobb, the indefatigable alfalfa reports on alfalfa.

In the second cutting of the sulphur treated plots, where the sulphur was applied last year, a yield of 4890 pounds to the acre was made, while the untreated plots yielded 3975 pounds to the acre, a gain of 825 pounds or 16 per cent of the treated over the untreated land. The plots treated this year with sulphur showed a slight increase, but none

worth mentioning. In this Mr. Cobb's observations verify our observations on Willow creek, which show that the first year of application adds very little stimulus to growth, but we will watch it another season.

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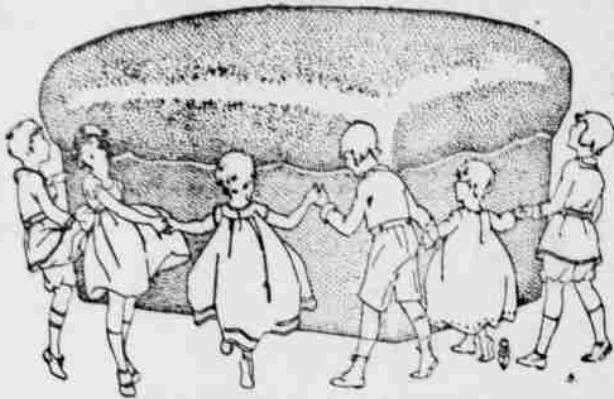
