U. S. IN POLISH FIGHT

IF LEAGUE IS UPHELD

Lloyd-George Recalls President Wilson's Enthusiasm For Independence and Article X.

Washington, August 31.—Possibilities of engulfing the United States in another general European conflict, this time directed against the revolutionary Soviet government of Russia, are seen in the peril in which Warsaw has been placed by invasion.

Information has come to the State Department that Lloyd George, in an address to the House of Commons, used this language: "We certainly should appeal to America. America up to the present time has not ratified the treaty, and there is the confusion which exists when the treaty is the subject of a conflict between the two great parties and cannot be settled. It is not for me to say what view the American executive will take. All I can say is this: I am only judging from the attitude of America at the peace conference. America was a strong protagonist of Polish independence. No man took such an active, determined and I may say zealous part in setting up Polish independence as President Wilson. I am quite certain that whatever differences of opinion there may be in America in regard to the league of nations, there will be no difference in the attitude toward Polish independence."

The British premier goes on to show that the Poles unjustly and unnecessarily provoked the war with the Soviet, and did it without sufficient strength to make good. He says

these same Poles must take such a licking as they deserve, but that Europe, or rather the Allies of the late war, will not permit of such a settlement as would sacrifice Polish independence. Poland was made a part of the league of nations as one of the signatory members. Under Article X it was entitled to have its territorial limits upheld against aggression. That is apparently forgotten while the Soviet government of Russia administers the licking Lloyd George says it deserves.

This utterance of the British premier is considered decidedly significant here, because of the especially close relationship in all diplomatic matters between him and President Wilson since the beginning of the war with Germany. The former does not declare that the United States should again become involved in the quarrels of Europe and incidentally of the air in behalf of Poland because

of any rights Poland may have, but in order to regain Polish independence.

The comment in Republican Congressional circles is that Lloyd George makes no mention of the fight being waged for Irish independence, which the Republican House at its last session sympathized with by resolution, nor does he make the slightest reference to the efforts being made in India to gain independence from the British crown. The Soviet government has been threatening to invade Persia and take the gateways to India. It is a dangerous thing in itself because opposed to sound representative institutions. A menace to Europe or Asia by the Soviet would be a menace to civilization. But it is held here that the independence of Ireland or India should be as much a cause for sending the youth of America to fight on foreign soil as is Polish independence.

It is recalled in this connection that President Wilson announced that what the American armies fought for in Europe was his fourteen points, including freedom of the seas and self-determination of all peoples. He made no mention of Irish independence at Versailles, but was especially interested in Polish freedom, Lloyd George says. His sentiments have not changed, as indicated by the note sent by Secretary Colby at his request. He himself is the author of Article X. That Governor Cox has the same view of the problem may be gathered from his own words: "What he promised I shall, if elected, endeavor with all my strength to give."
