Congress Needs to Know.
All congresses rather than the special committee needs education in the needs and merits of western land reclamation policies, according to N. J. Sinnott, congressman from the third Oregon district. Mr. Sinnott said that it takes more than petitions

to western senators and congressmen to get the necessary laws and appropriations for carrying out the western program. The western group is outvoted more than two to one, and the best way to get votes is to enlighten eastern men in irrigation and drainage problems.

Ship Cream Regularly.
"Right now is the time for you fellows to begin talking regular shipments, at least twice a week," says D. V. Chappell, in charge of dairy production at O. A. C., to Oregon creamery men. "Impress upon your patrons that you can't make first grade butter from second grade cream, and that you can't pay first grade cream prices from second grade butter sales."
