News About Oregon's Industries

Portland—Pickles, mops, the list of products turned out by 34 manufacturing concerns in the North Portland industrial district, 22 of which have come there since 1917. They employ over 2000 people and do a total business of \$125,000,000.

Klamath Falls—Forty thousand acres of pine timber, estimated to contain 1,000,000,000 feet, are reported to have been sold by the Hopkins estate to the Wright-Caldwell Co. The deal brought close to \$2,500,000. The tract places 99 percent of the timber west of the Klamath river in control of three companies.

McMinnville—The big fruit and vegetable cannery, the seventh owned by the A. Rupert company, has just been completed here at a cost of \$50,000. This gives the concern a capacity of 750,000 cases during the season, an output that means an expenditure of about \$2,250,000 for farm and orchard produce.

Portland—Baggage checks, shipping tags and all sorts of similar cardboard cuttings are in such demand that the Pacific Calendar & Tag company, formed here a year ago, is looking forward to building a new plant in 1921. This is the only place manufacturing printed shipping tags on the coast, making them from the sheet and delivering direct to the consumer.

Salem—Rain caused little worry in the hop section of Marion county and few losses occurred on account of inclement weather. The Oregon crop this season is estimated at 50,000 bales.

LaGrande—Timber is to be taken out of the Grande Ronde valley by the Deer Creek Lumber company, a Washington corporation, which recently purchased 12,000,000 feet of holdings near this city. The consideration was \$25,000.

Salem—Discovery of a hybrid prune, the "New Oregon," which experts declare will revolutionize prune growing in the entire northwest has been announced by Andrew Vercler, a Polk county orchardist. Tests showed the fruit superior in texture, sugar, acidity, content, drying qualities and carrying quality of the tree.

Eugene—The Lane County Lumber company has just been organized here and has purchased a mill on Fall creek and acquired a quantity of timber. Operation will begin in the immediate future.

Albany—Albany's new industry, the Cremona Phonograph company, will probably double the size of its plant next year and increase the city's income through its payroll. \$500,000. The present daily capacity of newly purchased factory is 70 phonographs, each of them requiring 60 days to complete. The company has patented improvements upon both motor and tone arm that will be installed in machines as soon as steel prices permit manufacture of these attachments.

Portland—With discontinuance of jobbing lines the Portland Rubber mills has undertaken an extensive advertising campaign playing up its best known product, Non-Skid rubber heels, for which there is a big demand in the northwest.

Salem—In order that ores may be brought out from the mines on the Little North Fork of the Santiam near Gold Creek, the Lotz-Larsen Mining company is putting in a road and bridge over which hauling may be done. This year permit bringing the ore out, the company is preparing to purchase more machinery.

North Bend—Ties manufactured here are being shipped to Portland by rail and loaded on large steamers bound for the Atlantic coast. The route will be through the Panama canal. It is said the demand for these ties exceeds the supply or the tonnage to carry them.

Ione—Natural gas has been discovered on the Zink ranch near this place and is regarded as a possible forerunner of larger wells.

Portland—Although the Bede Box and Lumber company opened this year,

has been turning out 10,000 fruit boxes daily for the growers of Yakima valley. Need has been felt for increasing the capacity and the plant will quadruple its output in 1921.

Cottage Grove.—Another sawmill has been opened here to cut the Glass timber. It will have a daily capacity of 29,000 feet. The mill is at Comstock.

Astoria.—An abundance of potatoes is to be found in Clatsop county this season and 50,000 bushels, it is estimated, will be harvested this year.

Reedsport.—Big mills in this section are resuming operations after a shut-down. These include the Johnson mill and the Winchester Bay Lumber company.

Madison.—Favorable conditions for marketing the cranberry crop are anticipated. These include the Johnson mill and the Winchester Bay Lumber company.

Albany.—Drilling operations of the Oregon Petroleum company, which were halted during the harvest season, have been resumed at LaGrande. When work was stopped the well was 200 feet deep and showed much promise. The drill had passed through 190 feet of asphalt.

STATION REPORT TELLS. Will it pay the Oregon stockman to buy up range steers this year to fatten and sell in the general market? The new Experiment station report, "Fattening Steers," will help him determine this question. Feeding alfalfa hay alone generally does not pay unless the market rises during the feeding. The cost of hay is generally greater than the value of the gains. With silage and alfalfa hay the gains in six-year tests at the Union branch station were produced at a profit, as they were twice as fast and at half the cost. The stock hay and silage were only average, and the stockman can do as well as the station. Send to O. A. C., Corvallis, and

ROBBER BEES ACTIVE. Bees finding trouble in getting honey in this slack season are likely to overcome the guards of any weak or dissipated colony and rob the hive, says H. A. Scullen, Oregon bee man and specialist at O. A. C. This may mean the spread of foulbrood, a serious disease among bees, as well as destroy the weak colony. If this begins Mr. Scullen cuts down the entrance till only one bee can pass in or out at a time. In bad cases the entrance should be entirely closed for an hour or more. It may be slightly enlarged the next day.
