Ice Cut With a Gas-Driven Saw.
For the purpose of cutting ice expeditiously during the last winter, there was devised a saw of an automobile type power plant and a circular saw at the end of an adjustable arm, so that the saw can be raised and lowered to the desired degree. The saw is pushed along on steel runners, the operator behind furnishing the motive power. A double lever arrangement just over the handle bars serves to control the raising and lowering of the saw. The portable saw in question cuts the ice into 20-foot squares. These squares are guided through the water to a gang of four circular saws, which cut the squares into the regulation sized cakes.

DAIRY POINTS

RETAIN PUREBRED BULL CALF

Good Dairyman Knows Value of Young Animal in Way of Improving Grade Herd.

Nature has her own percentage rules which are as inflexible in the long run, as the dealer's margin at a Monte Carlo gambling resort. According to this inflexible law of averages, there are about as many bull calves born each year as there are better calves.

Every good dairyman knows the value of a purebred sire of good record, and what such an animal may accomplish in the way of improving a grade or scrub herd. Despite their acknowledged value, it appears that 75,000 purebred bull calves of dairy breeds were killed for veal or were fattened for beef in 1918.

A chart has been prepared by the dairy division, United States department of agriculture, which furnishes a graphic illustration of what happened to the purebred bull calves in 1918. The line representing purebred Holstein-Friesian cows registered in 1918

runs out to \$0,000. The line for the bulls of this breed registered during the same year extends only to \$0,000. The difference, \$0,000, represents the approximate number of bull calves not registered. Presumably most of them were either vealed or fattened as steers.

The Jersey breed in 1918 registered 30,000 cows and about 12,000 bulls—a loss of 18,000 purebred sires, many of which might be more profitably employed in the work of improving scrub herds.

Guernsey and Ayrshire totals are less, but the percentage of loss is heavy there also. In the face of this waste it is estimated that five grades of scrub bulls are in use for every purebred bull. According to experts of the United States department of agriculture the replacement of scrub and grade bulls with good purebreds would quickly and materially raise the average production of dairy herds. One of the reasons for the surprising situation outlined is probably an underdeveloped system of distribution.

LONG PUZZLE TO SCIENTISTS

Strange Work Left by Mound Builders Never Has Had Anything Like Satisfactory Explanation.

The Serpent Mound, near Chillicothe, Ohio, the strangest earthwork left by the Mound Builders, is one of the most striking and puzzling creations that is to be found in the Scioto River valley. Over all, the mound is more than 1,300 feet long, and depicts a serpent of several convolutions, jaws extended, and an oval within the grasp of the huge jaws. The groundwork is from two to four feet in height, and from three to four feet in thickness. Within the oval, beyond the extended jaws, archeologists have found an altar of stones and other ornaments.

An old Indian fighter who died in the West several years ago, nearly 100 years old, declared he had heard a story in his younger days of a tribe of strange Indians in the Scioto valley who each year held a full festival and gave a great powwow on a snake's back. He said he never could understand the meaning of the story until later in life, when he heard of the Mound Builders. His recollection of the story, had it been given to students of the mounds, might have served to give them new theories on which to base their research work. He said the strange race were supposed to sacrifice a certain number of children born under the first full moon of spring. For this the Mound Builders might have used the stone altar which has been found.
