Vote For Prosperity.

Casting one's vote is a serious business. A vote is more potent for good or evil than almost any power in the world. It is greater than armed force—greater than the power of money.

Next November you will cast your vote. When you go to the polls ask yourself seriously if you are voting so that good will result to yourself and to your fellow.

In short do you want to live like honest-to-goodness upstanding men, in comparative comfort and decency or do you want to live as do the lower classes of Europe and Asia?

You declare that you want to continue the American standard. You admit that much during the past eight years, and the facts bear you out in this. You assert wages have been high, prices have been so excessive that your actual standard of life has slumped amazingly.

If you want to continue to live in comfort, you must vote the Republican ticket. If you are willing to adopt the low standard of the Orient and Europe, then you must vote the Democratic ticket.

Deal with us and we will explain. The Democratic party stands for no tariff to protect American industry and the workers in American industry.

The Democratic party is committed in this campaign to a low tariff policy. Its platform says: "We re-affirm the traditional policy of the Democratic party in favor of a tariff for revenue only."

President Wilson in stating his 14 peace terms to congress demanded "the removal as far as possible of all economic barriers and the establishment of an equality of trade conditions among all nations consenting to the peace and associating themselves for its maintenance."

The Democratic party has declared openly and without disguise for a free trade policy—a kind of soviet world trade arrangement.

Specifically this means that Australian wool shall be admitted to this country free of duty to compete with wool raised here. It serves notice that South American beef shall be admitted free of duty to compete with beef raised here. It indicates that eggs from China shall come in free of tax to vie with American produced eggs. It means that—but why go on. Is the thing not self evident? In these lands production cost is much less than in America because the worker gets less wages. Human rights are not much considered in the scheme of things. Standards of living are low.

Thus cheap labor will produce goods of one kind or another which will be sent here and brought in free to compete with American made goods. The foreign goods will undersell the American made goods because they are produced or raised by low paid workers.

The purchasing public will take these lower priced goods. American goods will become a drug on the market. If

they are to sell wages of workers must be cut until they are on a par with foreign wages so that American articles and goods and products sell in competition with foreign produced articles and goods and products.

Therein is the menace. The Democratic policy of no tariff will lower the standard of living here because it will automatically reduce wages. Furthermore, when it appears that American made goods cannot sell in competition with goods from the Orient and from Asia made by poorly paid workers, many factories and plants will shut down and the American workers will become idle and prosperity will fade away.

The Republican party is pledged to a protective tariff—a tariff which equalizes the cheap foreign labor and the American labor. Goods are taxed when imported so that they compete on a fair basis with American goods. Thus high wages are guaranteed, employment is guaranteed and general prosperity is guaranteed.

The League Situation.

Governor Cox, by announcing that he and the President are in accord on the League by refusing to state definitely the reservations which he is willing to accept and by putting himself in an unfriendly attitude with the Senate by trying to discredit the Senate by his continual harping on the "Senatorial Oligarchy," has made it impossible for him to secure a ratification of the treaty and the league covenant. There will be a deadlock, because there is more than one-third of the membership of the Senate opposed to the present

form of the League. Even if every Democratic candidate for the Senate should be elected at this time, this situation would still prevail. Mr. Cox says the Senate would accept his election as a mandate to ratify. Did Mr. Wilson accept the results of the election two years ago as a mandate? Nay, verily.

Mr. Harding says, if he should be elected, he will counsel with the best men in the Republic in regard to the formation of an association, or league, which will safeguard our constitutional rights and at the same time lesson the dangers of war. He is not in favor of the league in its present form. If it is possible to frame up a covenant which will tend to prevent war and still safeguard our constitution, it can be done in this way. The only hope for any sort of association or league within the next two years, possibly four, is in the election of Warren G. Harding. The majority of the American people, no doubt favor some kind of a league, but they do not favor one which will impair our national integrity and embroil us in every foreign row. The people who believe in an association or league of nations should vote for Senator Harding.

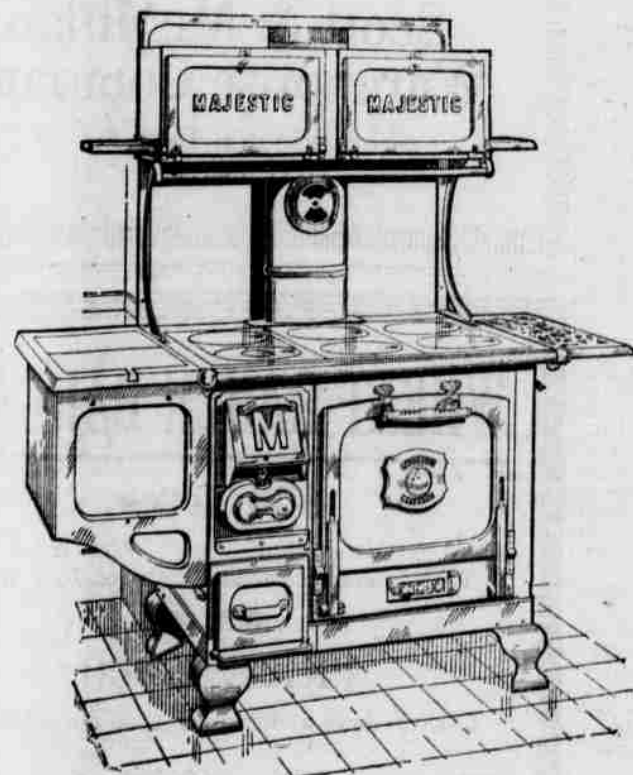
