

Oregon Home Coming Week, Nov. 12 and 13

University of Oregon. Business, Oregon, October 28—Nothing is going to be expected by the committees on Homecoming this year to make the annual, former students and friends of the University feel at home when they come back to Oregon for Homecoming on November 12 and 13. The committees are making more elaborate plans and are spending more money than ever before in the history of the University to show the old Oregon graduates a real old time Homecoming.

The football coaching staff is spending more hours over a combination from the wealth of material out for variety positions which will send the Sun Dodgers back to their northern haunts defeated. The ceremonies will start Friday evening with a big pep rally through the downtown streets of Eugene. Each house on the campus will be represented in the parade with a special noise making machine which will make the home-comers and citizens think of Armistice Day, 1918. From the time the college gang turns the corner at 11th and Willamette streets the town is going to be one red flare according to the committee in charge of fire works.

After the demonstration of Oregon enthusiasm through the downtown section the gang will march back to Kincaid field where President Campbell is to introduce the Oregon team which will meet the University of Washington on Hayward field the following day.

"We are going to see that every Oregon man and woman is made at home during the week-end," is the word from the Welcome committee. As many cars as can be drafted into service for the day through the local Chamber of Commerce which is co-operating with the student committees, will be labeled "Official Alumni Cars," and any alumnus, former student, or friend of the University on the campus for the week-end will be at liberty to hail these cars anywhere for transportation.

There will be a registration booth on the corner of Fifth and Willamette where all coming to Eugene for the week-end will be asked to register and receive tickets for the informal dance which will be a fitting climax to the festivities of the week-end.

Submitted by the Legislature—COMPULSORY VOTING AND REGISTRATION AMENDMENT—Purpose: To amend Section 2 of Article II of the constitution of the State of Oregon so that provisions may be made by law to require compulsory voting, to require registration in their respective election precincts by all persons who are entitled to vote, to permit such persons to cast their ballots by mail or otherwise, when necessary by reason of illness, or in case of absence from the voting precinct during the entire day of election, or service in the army, navy or marine of the United States. Submitted by the Legislature—CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—REGULATING LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS AND THE PAYMENT OF LEGISLATORS—Purpose: To amend Section 15 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon to limit regular legislative sessions to sixty working days and extra sessions to twenty days, to regulate the introduction of bills after the fortieth day of the session, and to provide that each legislator shall receive not more than three hundred dollars for services or when convened in extra session by the governor not more than five dollars per day, also mileage at the rate of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled to and from the place of meeting by the most usual route. Street, Portland, Oregon.—SINGLE TAX CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—Purpose: To assess all taxes necessary for the maintenance of state, county, municipal and district government upon the value of land itself irrespective of the improvements in or on it and to exempt all other property and rights and privileges from taxation, from July 1, 1921, to July 1, 1925; and thereafter to take the full rental value of the land, irrespective of improvements, as taxes, and no other taxes of any kind to be levied, by amending Section 1 of Article IX of the Oregon Constitution.
