Whole System of Transportation and Regulation on Trial

A new era in railroading is predicted by A. P. Thom, general counsel for the Association of Railway Executives. He contrasted the outlook for the future with the "economic tragedy" of the punitive and restrictive system of governmental regulation.

"The new system," he said, "is an economic triumph of popular government carrying out a new conception regarding the relationship transportation bears to the public welfare." He urged that adequate opportunity be allowed for testing its efficiency. Mr. Thom said under the act a new constructive transportation policy calling for the preservation "in full vigor" of both rail and water transportation has now begun in earnest.

"Men may still debate," said Mr. Thom, "as to the adequacy of the legislation which has been adopted, but there can be no reasonable difference of opinion as to the soundness or value to the nation of the new conception that has been accepted of the responsibility of government to regulate and to help of the fact that the credit of these carriers, on which their ability to perform their essential public service depends, is a matter of profound and vital public concern, and must, out of regard for the public welfare, be dealt with on reasonable and sound business principles. It remains now to give the new system a fair trial."

Not only is the Transportation Act now on trial, Mr. Thom declared, but also the Interstate Commerce Commission, organized labor, the various state commissions and the carriers themselves.

"The carriers are on trial, because an effort has been made to extend to them help of a substantial character in the performance of their public duties, and public opinion will hold them to a strict accountability for the fidelity and efficiency with which these duties are performed."

The carriers, Mr. Thom added, "must be keenly alive to their own responsibility and must 'rise to the level of their enlarged opportunities and view their obligations from the standpoint of the public right and welfare."

\$1,000,000 a Day for Smoke.

It is easy to understand why in less enlightened ages fire was regarded universally with superstitious reverence or superstitious fear. Its visitations were often so sudden and unexpected, it came to such unthought of places and in such

strange ways that it had the appearance of a spirit, often beneficent but more often malicious, wholly beyond human control.

However much the public at large may lag behind, it is to the credit of America that she has taken the lead in the matter of investigating the causes, of tabulating the results of investigation, and of arriving at definite conclusions.

Of the three human failings that are the causes of nearly all fires—carelessness, ignorance and criminality—the first-named is easily chief. Taken together, and making every allowance for doubtful cases, ignorance and criminality play a very inconsiderable part in the ever-recurring toll of disaster.

Americans' tolerance of their huge fire losses is a striking inconsistency, as in many other ways this country leads the world in saving expenses, not in

preventing consumption, but in regaining production.

If America could but remove from the debit side of her ledger the gain of \$200,000,000 a year that goes up in smoke and convert the loss to an asset, her premier position would be doubly secure.

And to do this is simply a matter of national "wood house-keeping," proper building construction, using fire-retarding materials wherever possible, and providing adequate protection in the form of modern fire-extinguishing apparatus.
