SHELTER NOT FACTOR IN FAT LAMB PROFITS

Sheds in Feeding Tests Paid Returns on Investment, But no Profit Beyond That.

Oregon Agricultural College Corvallis, Nov. 3.—Sheds used in lamb fattening tests at the Eastern Oregon branch Experiment station, Union, paid only fair returns on the money invested in them, with no net profit on the entire business of finishing lambs for market.

Lambs with shelter gained 3 pounds per day, as an average over three years of tests. Lambs in the open lot averaged gains under otherwise like conditions of 29 pounds per day. Eight hundred and seven lambs were fed.

While the sheltered lambs thus made 3 per cent more gain they ate 1 per cent more feed, which, with interest and depreciation the shed investment balanced the additional gain.

The lambs fed in the open without shelter of any kind made rapid and economical gains. The best feeders proved to be thrifty, blocky lambs of about 60 pounds weight at beginning and 85 at close of feeding period.

The grain was unground barley, beginning with about a quarter of a pound and increasing it to a pound a day for the remainder of the period. It was evenly distributed so that each could get its share.

Plenty of salt and clean water conducted to liberal eating.

TIMELY FARM HINTS.

Farm Crops, O. A. C.—Advanced rate of seedling for all sown wheat is advisable because of the lateness of fall planting. For all seeding after November 1, two bushels of good, clean seed should be used to the acre.

Soils, O. A. C.—Careful grading of potatoes after harvesting is essential either for storage or for market. Higher prices may be expected and cull potatoes may be saved and used on the farm. Good storage is important to insure good keeping.

Plant Pathology, O. A. C.—The blue stone lime method of seed treatment is preferable to formaldehyde for late fall planting. This is one of the many helpful hints contained in the circular published by this department. This circular (No. 174) is on the treatment of seed for smut prevention and may be had by writing the college.

Poultry, O. A. C.—All pullets should be in their winter quarters by the first of November. Any change in quarters after this will throw them into a molt and egg production will be held up for several weeks.

Farm Mechanics, O. A. C.—If the farmer wants to get full time out of his tractor on these damp and foggy days he must get started on time. Extra precaution should be taken to keep moisture out of the magneto and wiring, for this means hard starting until the moisture has evaporated. In starting remember that cold fuel is heavier than warm fuel, therefore open the needle valve in order to lift as much fuel as is lifted when the engine is warm.

Practically 60 per cent of the wood that is going into the phonographs turned out by the four companies manufacturing these instruments in Oregon comes from this state. One concern is experimenting with larch in the making of amplifiers, while all find that spruce is best for carrying tone.
