

### Farm Bureau to Hold Big Meeting—Important Decisions To Be Arrived At

The Farm Bureau will hold its first county-wide mass meeting of the I. O. O. F. Hall on Friday, November 12th. It was hoped to arrange for this meeting on Saturday but the plans of the National Farm Bureau do not permit of Mr. Gray's spending more than three days in Eastern Oregon and in those three days he will address four county meetings. Under the circumstances we should count ourselves fortunate that Morrow is to be included as one of the counties to be visited.

The people of Morrow county will have an opportunity to learn at first hand the real plans of the great Farm Bureau movement in all its aspects. How does it propose to help you to greater prosperity? How can you help? This will be an all-day meeting. At 10 a. m. the meeting will be called to order and committees get down to business on the coming year's plans. A report of the work accomplished by the Farm Bureau during the last year will be made and a program for the coming year will be worked out. At 11 a. m. will be held the annual election of officers. In the afternoon the big scene will be on. Oscar Keithley, county president, will give a brief outline of the county plan of work.

George A. Mansfield, president of the temporary state organization, will present the State Federation plan. Chester H. Gray, member of the National Executive Committee of National Federation, will present the plans of the Federation in the county-wide aspects.

Paul V. Maris, Extension Director, will also assist in the discussion. But the membership of the Morrow County Bureau have the all-important job of the day.

The temporary State Farm Bureau organization cannot become a fact until twelve county Farm Bureaus have approved its plans. Whether the State Farm Bureau co-operates with the National Federation depends upon the vote of these county organizations.

This is the farmers' business. The farmers are organizing this organization is six years old; last year it had 1,600,000 members. Can you beat that for a record? It is the strongest voice the producer has ever raised in agricultural and marketing questions. It will be heard. Will you help in the shout-out?

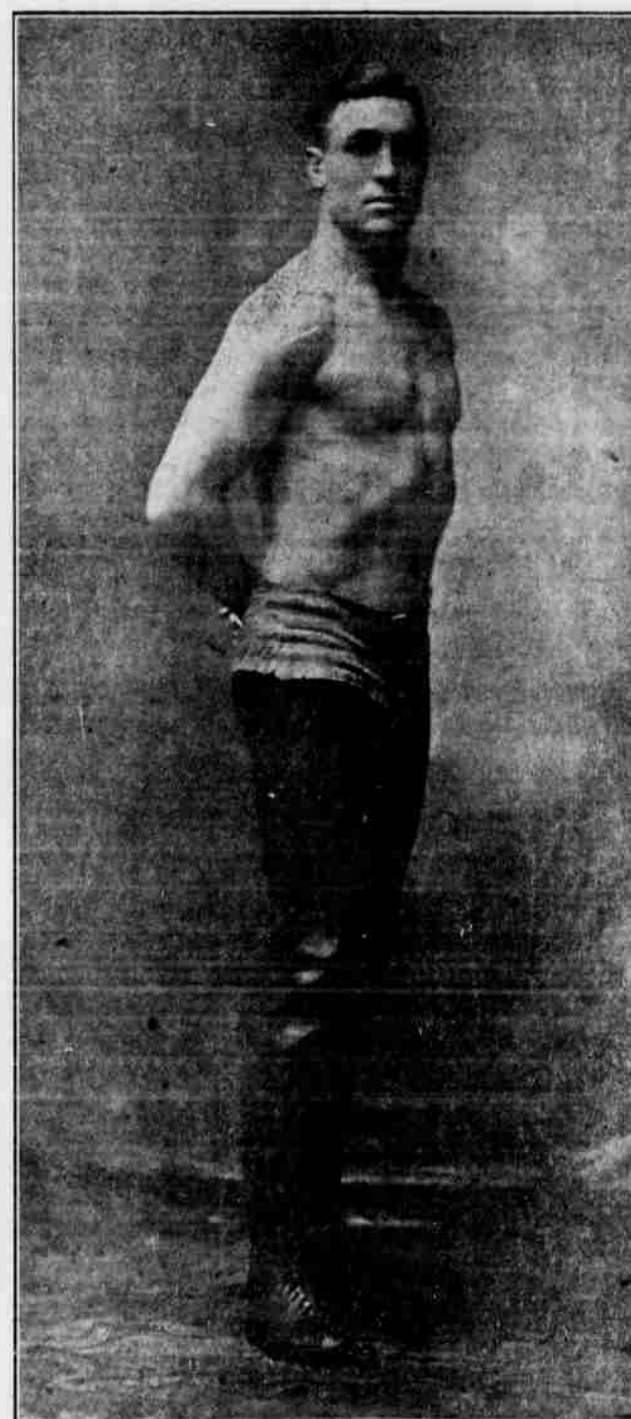
