News About Oregon's Industries

Portland—Exports cleared through the Portland customs house during 1929 have a total value of \$52,998,000 according to figures compiled during the past week. Exports for the year show an immense gain over 1919, despite the fact that the Oriental market, usually a heavy buyer, has been dull for several months. Wheat, mostly for the United Kingdom, with a value of \$2,529,345, was the largest item of export. Burlap from British India shows up biggest on the import list for September.

Forest Grove—Ten carloads of fine brick have been sent by the Forest Grove Clay products company to Eugene to be used in the new buildings being put up on the University of Oregon campus. The plant began operations only a few months ago and is now turning out large quantities of face brick and hollow tile. One of its big contracts is supplying material for the Masonic and Eastern Star home.

Salem—The first gun of the "Mistland" advertising campaign, to be put on by the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association, is to be fired in New York city, the greatest prune market in the world. Leading dailies with a circulation of 1,000,000 will be used for

six months, in addition to large posters to be put in elevated and subway stations, through which 3,000,000 people pass daily. The posters are also intended to call attention to climatic conditions of the state.

Portland—Trailers made in Portland by the Farm and Tourist Trailer company are now trundling after innumerable automobiles in this section. So great is the demand for these home products that the company will soon be compelled to enlarge the capacity of its plant. The firm is the pioneer in this business in Oregon.

Portland—Announcement has just been made of an increase in capitalization of the Columbia Wool Basin Warehouse company from \$400,000 to \$1,200,000. More than half of the additional \$800,000 will be subscribed by Portland people.

Grants Pass—Properties owned by the Alameda Mines company, which have been inactive since 1916, will soon start operations. The company has been testing ores in the past 18 months and is prepared to open up further ore bodies. The outlook for other mines in the vicinity is improving and Galice will probably become a big mining camp in the near future.

Portland—Desirability of Oregon spruce and juniper for manufacturing pencils and penholders is largely responsible for bringing to this city the Morningstar-Pacific Pencil company. The slats have hitherto been made at Bend and shipped east in carloads, but at a great disadvantage because of this expensive method of getting them

to the source of graphite lead. The new company plans to make the completed pencil in this city as soon as it can get plans under way early in the year.

Lakeview—The Willow Ranch Lumber company, operating the Fandango sawmill, has recently put in operation a huge tractor for the purpose of hauling its product to the railroad. The machine is 75 horsepower and weighs 15 tons. It draws seven five-ton trailers and the whole equipment greatly resembles a small train, as it is fitted with electric lights and a small searchlight.

Portland—Oregon still produces precious metals in considerable volume, according to figures on 1919 just completed by the United States geological survey. During that year the output amounted to \$1,514,725, including silver, copper and gold. Baker county's 22 mines contributed all but \$155,313 of the state's total mineral output.

Burns—Sunflowers are making a remarkable good showing in Harney county. At one place 54 tons per acre was the yield.

Marshfield—The first complete electric mill in Coos county is now in operation and is cutting about 20,000 feet of lumber per day. It was put up by the Marshfield Mill & Timber Co. and will cater principally to local trade.

Klamath Falls—The Big Lakes sawmill has begun operations recently, making the fifth big mill of its kind in the city.
