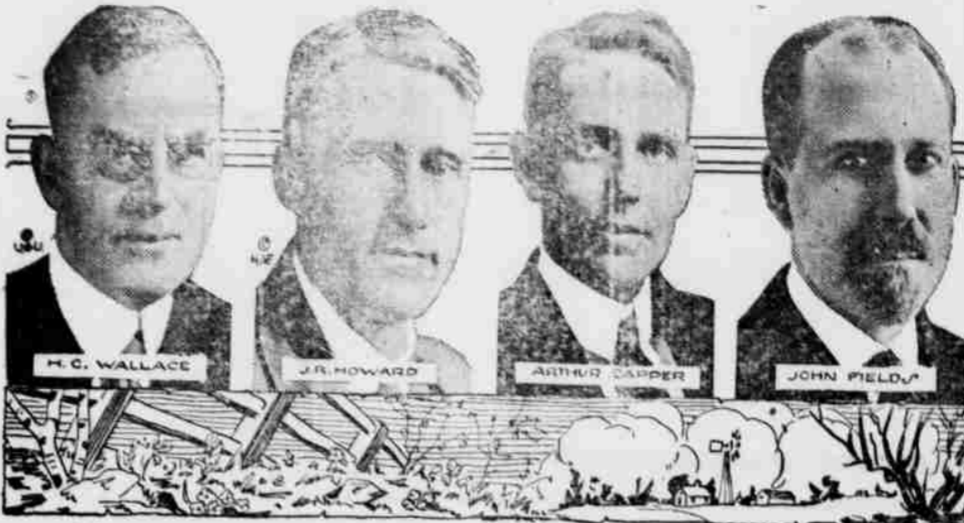

Howard, farmer, president National Farm Bureau Federation, Clemons, Ia.; Senator Arthur Capper, of Kansas, publisher Capper's Weekly, and John Fields, publisher Oklahoma Farmer, Oklahoma City, known as kaffir corn man of the west.

RANGERS DO ROAD WORK
C. L. Keithley, forest ranger, arrived here last night after doing road work with a group of nine foresters above Bingham Springs. The men, under the direction of J. C. Kahns, supervisor of the Umatilla forest, have been cutting a road out of the side of the bluff. The work, Mr. Keithley says, is extremely difficult and only about 100 yards has been built. The intention of the forest service is to make the road a part of that to the summit. Mr. Keithley reported from Bingham Springs and says the roads are in very bad condition because of the continued rains of the past week.—Pendleton E. O.

PAHM AND HOME POINTERS.
The average Oregon cow produced about 351 pounds of milk carrying 18 pounds of fat, in October. The 4625 cows in testing associations averaged 467 pounds of milk with 25 pounds fat. It was the cows that gave more rather than the general average that made the profit. The college extension service will tell you how it is done.—Claude Huston, Eight Mile farmer, was here on business Monday.

O. A. C. Dairy.
Heus cannot do well on a whole grain ration only. Use of the straight grain ration will soon result in loss of egg production and in digestive disorders. Ground feed as well as green feed and animal proteins are essential in a successful feeding system.—O. A. C. Poultry.
Lamb's winter shelter made slightly better gains at the Eastern Oregon experiment station than those fed in the open. From the standpoint of feed required per hundred pounds of grain the sheltered lambs were offered 27 per cent less hay, and actually ate 22 per cent less hay and 15 per cent less grain, than the open lot sheep.—O. A. C. Annual Husbandry.
Alfalfa fertilizer with sulphur in certain southern and central Oregon soils not only produces a much larger but also a much better and cleaner crop. Weeds are crowded out by the additional vigor of growth.—O. A. C. Station.
Garden slugs are usually had in many places this year because of the wet fall. Farmers and gardeners control them by spraying their plants with bordeaux, 1-4-50, and then spreading chopped leaves of lettuce or other green eaten by slugs, poisoned with one sixteenth as much calcium arsenate. Lead arsenate is not dependable for slug control.—O. A. C. Entomology.

Two Captors Are Paid.
John McCartan and Barney Devlin, Kanella sheepherders, were sent checks for \$100 each yesterday afternoon by the county commissioners as their share of the reward for capturing Irvin LeRoy Stoop and Floyd Henderson, jail breakers now under sentence of life imprisonment in the Oregon prison. The sheep men took the two escapees without assistance on the Saturday following the jail break and were unopposed for the \$100 reward placed by the county for the capture of each. Other claims, all of which are contested, will be settled in court.—Pendleton East Oregonian.
