We have failed to find in other election laws of the State of Oregon where a man may sit and determine who is le gutly elected in an election wherein h himself is a candidate, and we wish assure the public that we feel embar

assed in this position.

In the decision that has been made i this election by the board of director we have tried to follow the law as se forth in the statute. One of the provisions being that the general electilaws of the State of Oregon in regard t the nomination of candidates shall no apply to an irrigation district election and it is to be hoped that judgment will not be passed on this action on the parof the board of directors until the stat. utes referred to have been consulted Every action of the board of director the best interests of the district.
