Teel Bonds Forged.

Forged bonds of the Teel Irrigation District to the amount of \$100,000 were sold by Milholland & Hough, bond brokers of Spokane, according to a confession made this week by J. B. Hough. This firm had a contract for the sale of Teel bonds, and did sell some of them. The members of the firm disposed of \$100,000 of the bonds to James F. Callahan, a mining man, but instead of delivering genuine bonds they forged certificates, making a duplicate of the district seal and forging the signatures of the district officers. The bond dealers have been taking up the interest coupons on the spurious bonds and paying the interest themselves.

John B. Milholland committed suicide the first of the week, and his partner, J. B. Hough, is now in jail. Both men are known in Echo, having been here several times on business connected with their handling of the Teel bonds. No liability attaches to the Teel District or its officers by reason of the forgery of the bonds.—Echo News.

Ranch Home Burned.

Fire destroyed the home of Fred Rauch near Butter creek last Saturday, and Mrs. Rauch was severely burned about the head and arms while rescuing one of her children from the burning building. The fire started while Mrs. Rauch was rendering aid. The lady became ignited and the flames soon spread to the building. Two of the children ran from the house but the next to the youngest one was asleep in the bedroom and Mrs. Rauch had to make a dash through the flames to save the child.

Mrs. Rauch was away from home at the time, and his wife walked two and a half miles to the Ayers ranch, carrying the baby, before her burns could be dressed. Mrs. Rauch was brought to Echo Saturday evening and is now getting along very well. Fortunately she was

wearing glasses, and although her face was badly burned, her eyes were protected by the glasses and were not injured. The dwelling and contents were a total loss.—Echo News.

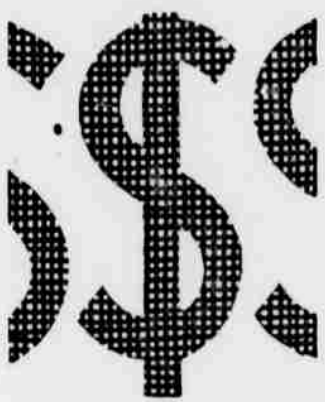
