W. B. Barratt, state highway commissioner, spent a few days at Heppner home this week, departing on Wednesday morning for Arlington to join the other members of the commission. An inspection of the John Day Highway will be made by the commissioners and the trip will be extended through Grant and Baker counties, much of which it will be necessary to make on horseback. This will wind up the inspection tour of the commissioner, which will include all the high ways of the state. At the May meeting of the commission, the advertising of bids on the grading of the Lexington gap and other work on the Oregon-Washington Highway to the east of Heppner, will be authorized. Mr. Barratt expects that this work will soon be under way, as it will not take a great while to complete the necessary legal procedure before the contracts are let.

Judge W. Dutton is up from Portland for a visit of a week or so, while attending to business matters here. Mr. Dutton still has large land holdings in and around Heppner. Much of this land is under cultivation this season and the grain growing thereon never

looked better and more promising for a good yield, consequently Mr. Dutton is in good spirits. California farmers and fruit growers are very hard hit this season and are suffering heavy losses because of no market for their products. To be sure there

is not much to offer in this respect here at present, but Mr. Dutton looks for conditions to improve along this line, and sheep, wool, cattle and grain will all find a fairly good market. Lambing was excellent, the wool clip is one of the best and a bumper wheat crop is in sight.
