LEGION MEN HIT BY RULING

National Judge Advocate Decides Organization Officer Ineligible If Holding Public Office.

A decision of far-reaching importance affecting the participation in politics of men holding office in the American Legion has just been handed down by Robert A. Adams, national judge advocate of the Legion, in response to an inquiry from the Inter-Post Council of Los Angeles, Cal.

At its annual election held in December a Los Angeles post elected Channing Follette as commander for 1921. A short time afterwards Follette was appointed justice of the peace by the board of supervisors of Los Angeles county.

The question arose whether, in view of the fact that Follette had been appointed to an office which, in its nature, except in the matter of filling vacancies, is an elective, salaried public office, he was eligible to serve as an officer of the Legion.

In his official ruling, the national judge advocate says:

"This being a salaried, elective public office, it is my opinion that the method of filling a vacancy is not so material in determining the eligibility of a Legionnaire holding such office. The office is elective, although the case with which we deal is that of an appointment."

"The purpose of the constitutional provision is of course, to prevent, so far as possible, the use by a member of the Legion of his Legion membership in furthering a political career. Consequently, the effect of an ap-

pointment is to no wise disqualify him as eligible, and it is my opinion that the incumbent is to the acceptance of his office, rendered ineligible for the office of the American Legion."

It is believed that many Legion members, appointed to political offices will be affected by this ruling.

FIRST TO SIGN APPLICATION

Little Minnesota Lady Puts Her Name on Dotted Line for Auxiliary Charter.

The Women's Auxiliary of the American Legion is open to wives, daughters and sisters of Legionnaires as well as mothers and wives. Hence it was entirely proper for Pearl Ira Hoskins, six-year-old daughter of a prominent Legion member in Fergus Falls, Minn., to have the distinction of being the first signer on an application for an auxiliary charter.

Pearl says she likes her Auxiliary, but that it is a hard word to pronounce.

Movie Morals.

More and more it is becoming apparent that censorship of movies by states or localities is a crude and inefficient method of overcoming the admitted evils that make so many movies objectionable on moral grounds. If there is censorship, it should be at the source—at the studio where the films are manufactured.

A film recently exhibited in Portland is a case in point. No one who saw the Arabian Nights' pageant, "Kismet," would contend for a moment that this film should not have been exhibited in Portland. And no one would have desired to see it mutilated by local eliminations. It was a magnificent presentation.

But it contained many parts which were unnecessary to the purpose of its presentation. Shocking indecencies were interwoven with numerous scenes, and so interwoven that simply clipping a portion out of the film would have mutilated the presentation to the point of destroying the continuity of the story.

We use the word "shocking indecencies" advisedly, for several parents who took their children to the Arabian Nights' pageant were indignant enough to come to The Voter with their protests—yet all admitted that the film was worth seeing. Their regret was that they had taken their children there. Yet, an Arabian Nights' film would commend itself to any parent as desirable to show to his children.

None of these indecencies were essential to the story told. All could have been eliminated by the producer.

The exhibitor was helpless. A local censor board would have been equally helpless. The place to have caught the evil was at the source. And at that point, it was a producer's problem rather than that of a censor. It is the producer who must clean up his product.

What will cause him to? The losses that accrue through forfeiture of public confidence in his productions. Sooner or later the public learns to differentiate as between shows produced by producers who are careless and those who are careful not to offend. The doom of the producer is written in his indifference to the long memory of the public. Those producers who are still in business 25 years hence will be those who today are catering to the normal public, not pandering to the appetite for the salacious. Financial successes from indecency are usually short-lived—Oregon Voter.
