New Rates on Shipping Sheep Are Not Generally Understood
The Farm Bureau sheep committee which has been working on a reduction of rates for shipping sheep to summer pasture two months ago secured a very generous reduction as it had been promised them by the railroad company. The rates have been increased twenty-five percent since last year but the reduction which has been secured by the Farm Bureau sheep committee amounts to sufficient to leave the old rate in operation. There is some deviation from this but this is practically what it amounts to. The rates to points this side of Riverton, Montana and Walla Walla, are: Pendleton, \$75; Echo, \$111.50; Arlington, \$115; Condon, \$127; Heppner, \$127. The same tariff also gives a reduction from Walla Walla shipping point of twenty percent of the existing tariff. The reductions took effect in April but many
