 Portland auditorium earns net \$22,119 first six months of 1921.
 The Lead & Tilton Bank, pioneer financial institution of Oregon, bought during 1920, \$12,000 worth of steel safe deposit boxes and fittings from Oregon manufacturers in pursuance of the broad policy of the bank in using the facilities of local industries whenever possible.
 St. Helens Light company's new plant which increases capacity 1250 horsepower in operation.
 Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. announced \$1,000,000 extension program.
 Hood River—Columbia Gorge hotel plans annex and number of cottages on grounds.
