

The Oregon Wool Growers Sign Up

(Farm Bureau News)

The Oregon Wool Growers under the organization management of R. A. Ward have more than secured their minimum sign-up having now about 25 per cent of all the sheep in the Willamette valley in this organization. After July first they will undertake their final organization, a business manager will be chosen and they will go into the season's game.

Wool is rapidly being assembled at the Western Wool Warehouse company where it will be stored, graded and scoured. When the wool is graded each member of the pool will receive a slip showing the number of pounds of each grade. This U. S. licensed warehouse receipt is then available as security for advances of money. There seems to be no difficulty whatever in getting the advance on the wool through the Oregon Wool Growers association.

There are a number of Eastern Oregon growers who have already consigned their wool to this state pool many of them large growers. However, there will be no definite campaign on in Eastern Oregon until fall; prior to that time it is hoped to have a meeting of the interested sheepmen all over Eastern Oregon to see what definite plans can be worked out towards arranging for a proper representation for Eastern Oregon in this pool and the securing of management and salesmanship that will be entirely agreeable to Eastern Oregon conditions. When this meeting is held and if plans can be made that will be agreeable to Eastern Oregon sheepmen it is anticipated that a very large

membership will be secured in Eastern Oregon. The financing of members of the state wool pool both regarding sheep and wool seems to be pretty well taken care of.

Bee Specialist Coming

Professor Scullen of the bee department will make his long delayed visit to Morrow county in July. During that time we will visit as many bee stands as possible in the county. Many farmers have already served notice on the Agent that they wish to have their bee stands inspected and any others who would like to have Professor Scullen advise with them on their bee conditions will please notify this office within the next two weeks.

This

is the only plan that will assure to agriculture, consistent support on the many measures which come into conflict with the interests of commercial and financial groups.

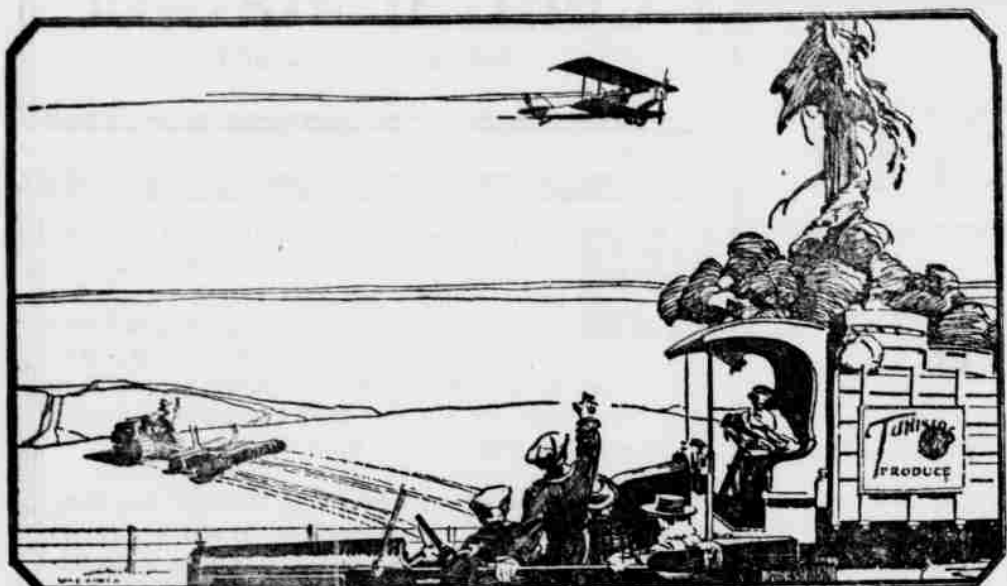
Fourth of July Celebration

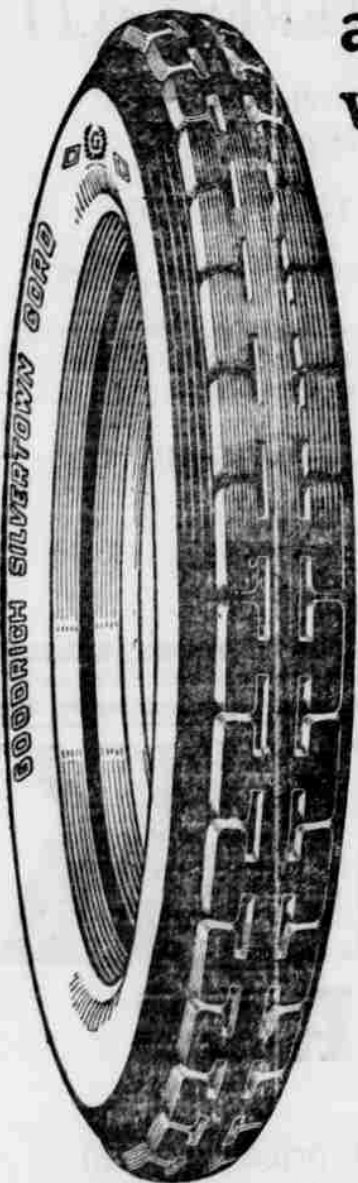
