But it's all distilled in heaven, and filtered through the trees.

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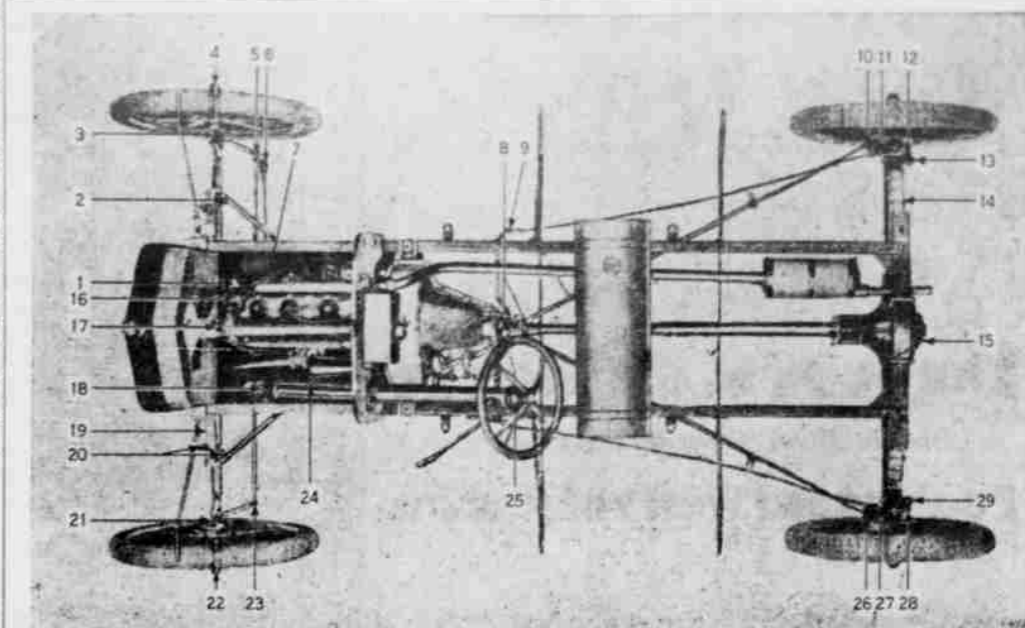
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Standard Oil Company's Correct Lubrication Chart for Ford Cars



Engine—1. Daily, or every 100 miles, pour sufficient fresh Zerolene No. 3 (former designation, Medium) into crankcase through filler pipe to bring level of oil to upper oil drain cock located on side of combination flywheel housing and oil reservoir. The oil level should not be allowed to rise higher than the upper oil drain cock, nor to drop lower than the lower oil drain cock. If too much oil has been poured into the crankcase during filling, the upper drain cock should be left open until all surplus oil has drained out to that level. The motor should not be operated except with both upper and lower oil drain cocks closed. To get correct indication of oil level, the automobile should be approximately level, and the engine not running.
At regular intervals, as recommended by the manufacturer, or in the absence of such instructions, every 750 miles, the oil in the crankcase reservoir should be entirely renewed in the following manner: First, remove drain plug in bottom of flywheel housing, allowing all oil to drain. This should preferably be done when the engine is warm, as the old oil when heated will drain faster, and less of it will adhere to the inner surfaces of the crankcase. Next, replace drain plug and pour four quarts of Calol Flushing Oil into the crankcase through filler pipe. Then start and operate the engine under its own power at a moderate idling speed for from one to two minutes, by which time all oil passages and inner surfaces will have been cleaned by the action of the flushing oil. The oil reservoir is now clean, but the splash troughs indicated by a flow of clean fresh oil coming out of the plug hole below. When certain that all flushing oil has been drained from the crankcase, replace the drain plug and pour into the filler pipe sufficient fresh oil to fill reservoir to proper level. Approximately four quarts of oil are required. When filling the reservoir through filler pipe, care should be taken that no dirt or other foreign matter is carried into the engine with the fresh oil.
Rear Axle—15. Every 500 miles remove filler plug in rear of differential housing and put in sufficient fresh Zerolene Transmission Lubricant "BBU" to fill the housing one-third full, or approximately to height of filler plug. Every 1000 miles the differential housing should be drained and thoroughly washed out with Pearl Oil (kerosene) and fresh lubricant placed in the housing. Care should be taken that the kerosene is thoroughly drained from the compartment before Zerolene Transmission Lubricant "BBU" is added.
Electric Generator—7. Every 250 miles apply three or four drops of Zerolene No. 3 to rear armature shaft bearings through oil cup provided for the purpose.
Commutator or Distributor—16. Daily or every 100 miles apply two or three drops of Standard Household Lubricant through oil cup provided for the purpose.
Front Wheel Bearings—4-22. Every 2000 miles remove front wheels and wash bearings and hubs thoroughly with Pearl Oil (kerosene). Repack hubs and bearings with fresh Zerolene Cup Grease and replace wheels, being careful to get proper adjustment on wheel bearings.
Springs—14-19. Every 500 miles, or whenever springs squeak, clean off all dirt and old oil and apply a small quantity of Standard Household Lubricant along the edges of spring leaves. A small brush may be used for this purpose, or the oil applied by means of Crook Standard Household Lubricant Handy Can with spout attached.
Steering Gears—25. Every 3000 miles unscrew the cap covering the steering gears (under steering wheel) and pack housing with Zerolene Cup Grease.
Grease Cups. Daily, or every 100 miles, turn down all grease cups about two complete turns, refilling cups with Zerolene Cup Grease when empty. Particular attention is directed to the two lubricant for the rear wheel housings, as these bearings are not lubricated by the action of the lubricant in the dif-

SCHEDULE OF LUBRICATION.
Daily, or every 100 miles: Engine Oil Level; Grease Cups; General Lubrication; Commutator or Distributor.
Every 250 miles: Electric Generator.
Every 500 miles: Rear Axle Springs.
Every 750 miles: Drain, flush and refill Crankcase.
Every 1000 miles: Rear Axle Housing; Front Wheel Bearings.
Every 2000 miles: Steering Gears.
Note—When daily average temperature is below 45 degrees F. Zerolene No. 1 should be used instead of Zerolene No. 3.
