 Emmett Hughes departed on Tuesday for Portland and Corvallis. He expects to spend the winter in the Willamette valley.

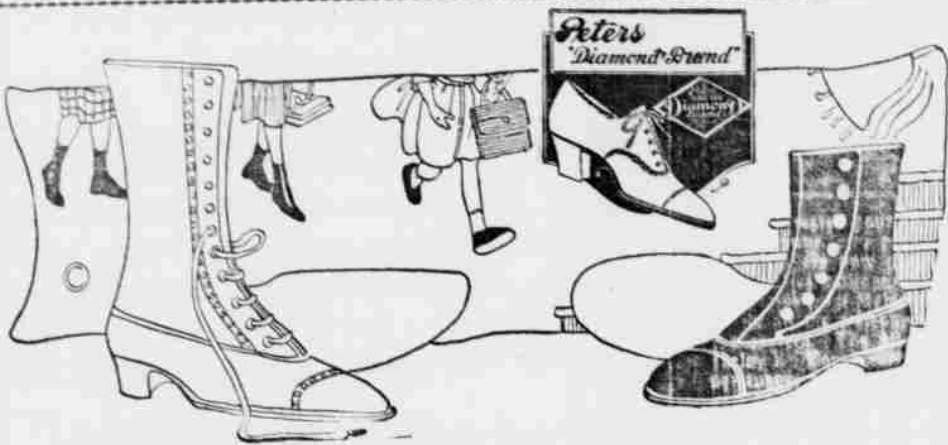
