There is no place of business where so many people call for advice in matters of everyday business as at the home bank.

Matters in regard to loans, investments, insurance, building or business changes are discussed over the bank counters.

It is all a part of the day's work with the banks in our cities and our country towns to serve their customers in this way.

It goes in with the other service the bank renders of taking deposits, making loans and selling exchange.

Why Trade at Home?

Many people ask that question, but very few trouble to seek the answer. Why should people patronize their home merchants?

Because it is a great saving of time, and time today represents money.

Because the home merchant can only remain in business through the patronage of home people, and a town without merchants would be a sorry place in which to live.

Because the home merchant sells goods that do not have to be returned because of defects or inferiority of quality. It is the only way in which a local man can hold his trade.

Because the local merchant is not in the habit of charging excessive prices. You may at times be able to get the same article elsewhere for a little less money, but the quality will invariably be reduced in proportion to the price. The local merchant cannot afford to sell "cheap" stuff. His customers would not tolerate it.

Because the prosperity of a community depends upon the amount of money in circulation in the community, and that is regulated mainly by the marketing of surplus products abroad and the keeping of as much as possible of the receipts at home.

Because a community that spends most of its money abroad for sup-

plies soon finds that it has but little left for the purchase of additional supplies.

It is so simple a child could understand it, and what a child can comprehend should not go unheeded by adults.

Think it over.

Thinking may accomplish much good. It certainly will do no harm.

Returning to Normal.

Headlines in the newspapers play up the fact that the cost of living has increased 4.3 per cent during the past month.

The chief increase is shown to have been in potatoes, eggs, cheese, butter, sugar, oats, rice, peas, prunes, etc.

The price of luxuries, however, continued to fall.

Everyone who has followed the markets knows that the prices of the above mentioned staples which showed a slight increase have virtually all been down to a point as low or lower than the pre-war figure, and they are merely returning to a more normal basis.

In other words, deflation in the cost of food necessities of life has been complete, and the slight upward trend is a healthy sign of a return to normal conditions. It should not be used as an argument showing an increased cost of living which necessitates a maintenance of war wages and working conditions in certain lines of industry which have not yet been deflated.

In the last fiscal year the United States paid out \$4,000,000,000 in war and war preparation expenses.

That amount of money would have built 200,000 miles of hard-surfaced highways, 1,000,000 country school houses, or enough irrigation dams to have watered an area sufficient to support a population of several mil-

lion people. Spent on improving the Mississippi it would have made the river deep enough to carry the largest ocean liners and have left enough to build a hundred or more hydro-electric plants.

The billions spent on war and war preparation have gone up, or will go up, in smoke, with nothing to remind you of the expenditure except, per-

haps, maimed young manhood. The same sum spent on schools, roads and general internal improvements annually would bring the United States to the highest point of civilization ever reached on earth.
