Wave of Law Violation Breeding Defiance and Contempt of All Government

Washington, Oct. 3.—The address of Attorney General Daugherty upon "Respect for the Law" before the annual convention of the American Bar Association, taken in connection with certain activities in the internal revenue department and the prohibition enforcement unit of that department, is believed to forecast an aggressive campaign against the lawless elements, which are preaching and practicing open violation of the Constitution and the federal laws.

The brazen defiance not only of the federal laws but of the Constitution itself, by those who are opposed to the Eighteenth amendment and by those who hope to profit financially by violating the laws plus the encouragement openly given this class by public men and certain influential newspapers have aroused the authorities to a realization that drastic action must be taken or the country will be engulfed in a wave of outlawry.

A Question of Law and Order
As Attorney General Daugherty pointed out in his address in Cincinnati before the American Bar Association, the time has passed for a discussion of the Eighteenth amendment. It is now an integral part of the American constitution and it must be enforced.

It is the duty of every citizen to obey it. It does not matter whether some like it or not, for, as the Attorney General said: "It is the duty of the minority, as well as the majority, to obey the law." And if those who do not like a particular law or a constitutional amendment are permitted to disregard and disobey it, the same permission must be granted those who do not like some other law or constitutional provision. Once this is granted, there is an end to orderly government.

Representative and stable governments permit and encourage the utmost freedom of discussion of the wisdom of enacting new laws, but no stable government can permit any debate as to whether a law, once enacted, is to be enforced. To countenance open, insolent, repeated and widespread defiance of law and the authorities is to admit the government is without sincerity, courage and strength, that orderly processes have broken down and the constitutional guarantees of protection to life and property are worthless.

Lawlessness Multiplies Itself.
As another speaker at the Bar Association said: "Men who violate prohibition laws for selfish gain are not likely to obey other laws, and the respect for law among all classes steadily diminishes as our people become familiar with and tolerant to wholesale criminality."

The Bar Association went on to record as follows: "The people of the United States have undertaken to suppress the age-old evil of the liquor traffic. When for the gratification of their appetites, lawyers, bankers, merchants and manufacturers and social leaders, both men and women, soot at the law or any other law, they are sowing the seeds of anarchy and promoting mob violence. They are sowing dragons teeth, and they need not be surprised when they find that no judicial or police authority can save our country or humanity from reaping the harvest."

Public sentiment is becoming awake to a realization that the "rum runner" who is being made a hero in the columns of some newspapers, is in point of fact, a smuggler who is trying to evade the revenue laws and is on all fours with the criminal who endeavors to smuggle jewelry, precious stones or any other articles past the custom house.

Why Have Any Constitution?
Within the shadow of the capitol in Washington there is being maintained national headquarters of an association which openly advertises to purpose to be that of opposing the Eighteenth amendment. It has an office force and publicity and mailing departments. It is being asked if an active organization can exist for the open and avowed purpose of opposing and nullifying the Eighteenth amendment to the Constitution, why may not organizations be created and financed by parties interested in opposing and nullifying the income tax amendment, the right of trial by jury amendment, the freedom of religion, speech and press amendment; the right of private property amendment or any clause of the original Constitution which may not suit some class of citizens?

Brief Review of Act to Regulate Packers and Stockyards

Washington, Oct. 3.—The so-called "Packers' Bill" is a law. It is officially known as "The Packers and Stockyards Act." It regulates the buying, selling and handling of all live stock, live stock products, dairy products, poultry, poultry products and eggs, which are handled in interstate or foreign commerce.

Under the provisions of this act it is unlawful for any one in the packing business to engage in or use, either directly or in agreement with or combination with any other person, any unfair, discriminatory or deceptive practices, to make or give any person or locality any preference or advantage, or subject them to any prejudice or disadvantage, to engage in any act approximating the supply of any product, manipulating or controlling prices, restraining commerce or creating a monopoly.

The administration of the law devolves upon the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture. He may bring action upon his own initiative whenever he has reason to believe that there is any violation of the law. In such cases he must make written charges and furnish them to the accused, who is entitled to a copy of all evidence against him and the right of a hearing. In the event the defendant is guilty, in the opinion of the Secretary of Agriculture, after hearings have been given, the defendant may within 30 days appeal to the Circuit Court of Appeals asking that the Secretary's findings be set aside or modified. The Circuit Court of Appeals has exclusive jurisdiction and its decisions are final, subject to review by the Supreme Court of the United States.

Stock Yards Under Control.
The act also provides that stock yards and agencies handling live stock, whether in interstate commerce, must furnish responsible buyers without discrimination, schedules of rates, regulations and charges must be printed and kept for public inspection at the stock yards. These schedules must be in the form and manner determined by the Secretary of Agriculture; no changes shall be permitted in the published rates, charges or regulations of any stock yards, except after ten days notice to the Secretary and to the public, which notice shall state the proposed changes. It shall be unlawful for any stock yards or agency to engage in any unfair discriminatory practices in connection with the receiving, marketing, feeding, weighing or otherwise handling live stock in interstate commerce.

Upon his own initiative, or upon complaint of shippers, or upon complaint of any board of agriculture, or live stock association, state agency, the Secretary of Agriculture may, at any time, institute an inquiry regarding the observance of this act by stock yards or regarding the rates, charges or regulations in effect or proposed to be put into effect at any stock yards. Pending his decision upon the matter, the Secretary may suspend for 60 days the operation of any such rate or regulation and shall file a written statement of his reasons for such suspension. Hearings upon the suspension shall be held and the defendant given an opportunity of defense.

Violators Liable for Damages.
After the hearing the Secretary may determine what is just and reasonable in the case and issue orders accordingly, and the stock yards must abide by the order. Any stock yard or other agency handling live stock in interstate commerce which violates any of the provisions of the act or any order of the Secretary of Agriculture, shall be liable to the person or persons injured thereby, in the full amount of damages sustained in consequence of such violation, and such liability may be enforced by the damaged party filing complaint with the Secretary or by suit in any District Court of the United States of competent jurisdiction.

Every packer, stock yard, market, agency or other concerns covered by the act, must keep complete and accurate accounts and records regarding all transactions, in the manner and form prescribed by the Secretary of Agriculture, and open to the inspection of the Secretary of Agriculture, who shall have all the powers of investigation of conduct, practices and management of the packing and stock yard business which are now conferred upon the Federal Trade Commission.
