**Order Boys' Conference.**  
The Order Boys' Conference held here last week, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. of Oregon and Idaho, proved to be a most successful one. The delegations attended, bringing the total number of delegates up to seventy-five. Thirty-one of these came from Hermiston, eleven from The Dalles, nine from Pilot Rock, seven from Lexington, and twenty-one were Heppner boys. The leaders of these boys were: Paul K. Ahrens, of The Dalles; Howard M. James, of Heppner; F. B. Bennett, of Lexington; William King, of Pilot Rock; and Ernest Volker, of Hermiston. That these boys were willing to go to considerable trouble to attend these meetings is shown by the distance they had to travel, the highest being one hundred and thirty miles, by The Dalles.

The speakers here from out of town were A. J. Bittner, Institutional and Educational Director, Westminster Presbyterian Church, Portland; W. W. Dillon, Executive Secretary, Y. M. C. The Conference had the hearty support of the people of Heppner, as they entertained the visiting boys in their homes. A banquet was also given to the boys of the conference by the Heppner Brotherhood.

Don Case, of Heppner, was elected president of the conference. Edward Evans, of Pilot Rock, vice-president. A. L. McMillan, of Heppner, secretary, and George Tucker, of Lexington, sergeant at arms. These officers gave every help to the speakers, and carried the conference to a successful ending.

All of the meetings were held in the Federated church, except the last one on Sunday night, which was held in the Christian church and was open to the public.

Mr. Young, Interstate Boys' Secretary, gave a short talk to the high school students last Friday. He gave a brief outline of the program of the boys' conference and then told us of the good to be got from the conference.
