HIGH SCHOOL GIRL SENTENCED TO HANG ON JANUARY 13, 1922

Velma Case, the prisoner who was arrested by Sheriff Ray McDuffee on December 3, 1921, on a charge of bigamy and manslaughter, was sentenced

to be hanged on January 13, 1922. The jury was in deliberation only about eight minutes before the verdict was returned. Judge Kirk Cox then pronounced the sentence. The prisoner remained calm and serene all through the trial and laughed aloud when the sentence was pronounced. Much fun was made when Mr. James took the witness stand on behalf of the defense, and the stories which he made up as he went along were very amusing to the members of the class.
