"You can't get much new into Governor Pierre's head until you get some of the old ideas out," said the senator, and he stated that he thought Mr. Pierce would make a fine gov-ernor in event that he accepts good advice.
"This is the kind of advice I am

"This is the kind of advice I am giving him," said the senator. Senator Garland declared that he did not agree with the governor with relation to a paid highway commission. "We can't pay a salary large enough to compensate a man big enough to transact the duties of highway commissioner," said the senator. "We must depend on the patriotism of our best men to serve on this commission.

"Governor Pierce has said that he is almost persuaded to keep R. A. Booth on the highway commission. This I believe is an excellent idea. If three green men should be named as members of this commission their work might fail and that would in-

jure the democratic party."
Regarding a commission to handle state affairs, Senator Garland said he favored such a move, but would examine carefully into any bill to that end

that end.
"We pay too much money for the government of this state. There are twice too many people on the pay-roll," declared Mr. Garland. "As to the income tax, I believe in it. Ore-gon must be relieved of its heavy laxation, and taxes adjusted more

evenly.

"In regard to a gasoline tax, I favor a lower license for the automobile and a higher tax on gasoline. It is right that the man who travels most should pay the most."
