Prevention of the most serious potato diseases calls for attention to at least five factors-crop rotation, seed selection, seed treatment, spraying, and good storage conditions. Other factors influencing disease control are kinds of fertilizer, cultural methods, use of irrigation water, and keeping down insect injury.

For dry land potato culture where the potatoes are planted whole or are cut large it is better to plant the potatoes farther apart so they will have enough moisture to complete their growth.

Summer fallow plowed before pring weed growth begins yields about nine bushels more wheat to the acre than June plowed fallow. Also it produces harder, darker and better milling wheat.

The extensive shortening of the alfalfa acreage together with the hard winter cutting deeply into the hay reserve looks like a better year for alfalfa growers with good yielding fields.
