Hermiston, Oregon, May 8, 1922. To the Editor of Gazette-Times: I am not affiliated with the K. K. K. in any manner, directly or indirectly, and have so announced from the beginning of my campaign for the nomination on the republican ticket for Joint Senator of Umatilla, Union and Morrow counties. Not being a member of the so-called "Invisible Empire," I am not in a position to pass judgment upon its inner workings nor upon its ultimate aims and objects. 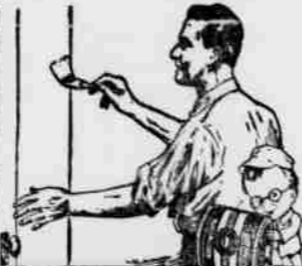

WILLIAMS A JOKE AS VICE-CHAIRMAN
