The Teeth and Their Relation to Good Health

(By Robert McCabe, 5th grade.)
An unclean mouth invites disease germs. A clean mouth is a great protection against disease germs. You should brush your teeth after the first meal of the day and after the evening meal, and you should see the dentist once every month, and brush the teeth in all directions to be sure that you have removed the food from between them.
We should keep our teeth in good condition so that they can do their work of chewing food. Decayed teeth cause an unclean mouth, toothache, and diseases of the gums will do the same. If the teeth are in bad condition you must go to the dentist at once.
There are thirty-two teeth in the set, sixteen upper and sixteen lower. The temporary teeth are the ones before the permanent ones come in. They should be taken care of just as well as the last set because they do the most important work of a child.
The molars come in behind the baby teeth. They must be taken care of or they will decay. You will have to watch them, to take care of them so that they won't decay. Remove the particles from between the teeth with dental floss or quill toothpick. Brush them downward and brush all directions on the surface of the molars. The inside must be brushed as well as the outside.
You must go to the dentist several times a year. Do not wait too long to go to the dentist. If you do it will be a big operation for the dentist and hard on you, and will cost you more to get them filled or crowned or capped. The baby teeth come out when the child is about five years old and then a new set comes in. You must take good care of them.
