RE-INSTATE YOUR WAR RISK INSURANCE, NOW

"Buddy, Protect Yourself."
This is the slogan selected for the Government Insurance Drive among war veterans of the Pacific Northwest June 12 to 17 inclusive, according to Bradley T. Fowlkes, insurance head of the United States Veterans' Bureau, who has charge of the campaign. Every ex-service man of Washington, Oregon and Idaho will be urged to reinstate his war risk insurance during this week.
The quota of veterans' insurance to be renewed by former service men of Heppner has been set at \$50,000. The campaign has the endorsement of Norman W. Engle, northwest representative of the American Legion, and all posts have been urged to cooperate actively in the reinstatement of war insurance totaling \$5,000,000 in the district. FOUR NEW BANKS FOR FARM CREDITS

The drive for better farm credits scored another success early this month, embodied in the announcement of the organization of a chain of four joint-stock land banks for northwestern states. The banks will be located in Portland, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Salt Lake. The Portland bank is in addition to the joint-stock land bank recently organized in this city, making two establishments to serve Washington and Idaho.
Nine large banking concerns are affiliated in the movement for the four new banks: The First National, Portland; First National, Los Angeles; Los Angeles Trust & Savings bank, San Francisco; National Copper bank, Walker Brothers bank, United States National bank, and Deseret National bank of Salt Lake City.
Each of these establishments, like the original Portland joint stock land bank, will be capitalized at first at \$250,000, giving each a lending capacity of \$4,125,000.
The new banks will provide long-time loans to farmers who own or operate farm lands, at 6 per cent. The farmer obtaining the loan pays the interest and a fraction of the

also supporting the drive which the Veterans' Bureau is conducting for the benefit of the former service men and women. Women's auxiliaries of ex-service organizations have offered to work for the success of the drive.
Application blanks for reinstatement of war insurance may be secured at any Legion post, Red Cross chapter, or branch office of the Veterans' Bureau in the three states, it was announced. The only requirements are that the ex-service man undergo a physical examination to prove good health and pay two months' premiums. These examinations are given free by Government doctors. Disabled veterans receiving federal compensation are not barred from the insurance privilege.
Mr. Fowlkes announced that insurance checks should be made out to the Treasurer of the United States and sent to the Seattle district office of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau. Government insurance rate blanks have been furnished the local Red Cross and ex-service men's organizations.
