URGES STATE TO CONTROL AUTOS

Illinois Secretary of State Shows Benefits from New Regulations CLOSE WATCH KEPT Says Accident and Death List Is Cut Down and Millions Saved Owners

The American people have been slow to realize that the automobile is too ambulatory and too numerous to be regulated entirely by local government. There should be state uniformity of regulation. Some central authority should have power to reach across several counties, to reach into or outside of any city and compel obedience to traffic laws.

The Illinois Law. In most states the administration of automobile laws has been placed in the hands of the Secretary of State but he has been given no power to enforce observance. This is left entirely to local police and sheriffs.

States Inspectors. Investigation showed that thousands of dollars which should have come into the State Treasury in the form of automobile and chauffeurs' license fees was not being collected and that traffic laws frequently were ignored.

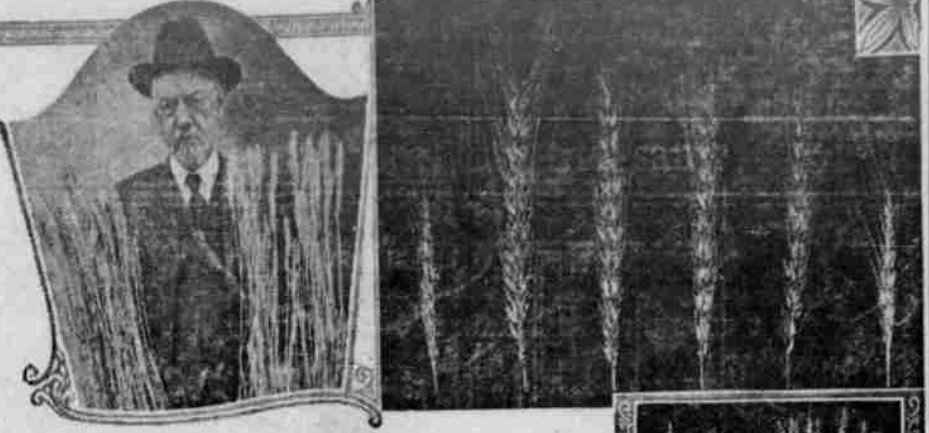
