FARM POINTERS
According to C. J. McIntosh, O.A.C.
Farm News Writer.

Oregon's 63 wheat varieties are 52
too many, is the teaching of the farm
crops department of the O. A. C. ex-
periment station at the state fair. The
remaining 11 varieties best suited to
all Oregon conditions have been tested
and are recommended for the dis-
tricts and for spring or winter plant-
ing as may be required.

The new type recultivation pruner
drier on exhibition in the station
booth at the fair cuts down labor,
cost and time of drying prunes fully
one-half in many cases. It also im-
proves the weight and quality of the
dried prunes by giving greater uni-
formity and eliminating "dummies."

A call for 6500 acres in English rye
grass and orchard grass for seed is
issued from the station booths. Ore-
gon conditions produce 700 pounds of
the rye grass seed and 450 pounds
orchard grass per acre. The value of
the acreage crop would be \$350,000
annually. The United States imports
more than 4 million pounds of these
seeds every year.

A good pasture mixture for west-
ern Oregon wet heavy soils as shown
on an exhibit card is English rye
grass 8 pounds per acre, red top 3, or-
chard grass 3, alsike clover 2, and
white clover 1. The crops should be
planted immediately.

The new copper carbonate dust
treatment for wheat smut on display
at the fair calls for 2 ounces copper
carbonate dust to 1 bushel of grain.
It is mixed either in a churn or in
large quantities in a mixer invented
by C. C. Calkins, county agent of
Morrow. No injury results from the
treatment, the grain can be held be-
fore seeding, stand is good and vig-
orous, and so far as tried protection is
good.

Spray Peaches Early.
Peaches should be fall sprayed with
Bordeaux 4-4-50. The earlier the bet-
ter. The main thing being favorable con-
ditions for blight and dieback infec-
tions. Get ahead of them.—O.A.C. Ex-
periment station.

Remove Diseased Potatoes.
Potato fields intended for certifica-
tion should have all diseased hills re-
moved before digging the crop. All
damaged, rough misshapen potatoes
should be sorted out at digging time.
—O. A. C. Experiment Station.

How to Select Seed Corn.
Select seed corn from stalks having
one good ear. Take no ears from fallen
or down stalks which are often
diseased. Avoid selections from thin
places in the field. Save seed NOW
and dry it promptly.—O.A.C. Experi-
ment station.

Early Dry Plowing Suggested.
Fall work is facilitated by early dry
plowing on most soils. Dry plowing is
easily done on irrigated ground.
Ground that has been in cultivated
crops will generally plow well before
the rains. Spring grain stubble is
more easily dry plowed than winter
grain stubble land which has not been
worked for a year. Thorough disking
in the fall makes early plowing easier
by loosening the surface, working in
stubble and refuse, and helping to
trap early fall showers, thus softening
the land and lessening the power
required.—O.A.C. Experiment station.
