

President Harding in Portland, July Fourth

President Harding is expected to arrive in Portland at 9 o'clock in the morning of July 4th and remain until late in the evening. There is no doubt that a great many of the citizens outside of Portland are anxious to see and hear the president during his visit to the state. He will give a general address at Multnomah field at about 2 o'clock in the afternoon at which everybody can be accommodated. He will appear at various functions during the day, detailed announcement of which will be made later. For the out-of-town visitors there will be the usual Fourth of July celebration which will consist of a parade in the morning in which the president will participate, children's fetes during the afternoon and a very elaborate display of fireworks in the evening. In addition to the fireworks the city will be splendidly illuminated, in fact, the illuminations are expected to be on a bigger scale than has ever been attempted in any previous celebration in the state. Bands of music will be stationed throughout the city during the entire day and evening. The general committee is making this announcement so that all the people of the state will have the privilege and opportunity of seeing or hearing the president during his stay in Oregon.

Farmers Will Inspect Wheat Nursery Saturday

The meeting of the wheat farmers of Morrow county at the wheat nursery on the Jake Wells farm near Heppner, to be held the coming Saturday, is of interest to every wheat grower in the county. Nurseries similar to this have been put out in Umatilla and Malheur counties and the work of the experiment station is being carried closer to actual conditions in these counties. These nurseries also give an opportunity to get data on the behavior under varied conditions of varieties that show up well at the Moro station. The meeting will start at 1:30 p. m., Saturday, and there will be talks by E. R. Jackman of the O. A. C. extension service and D. E. Stephens, superintendent of the Moro station. To get to the nursery turn east up the hill where the Blackhorse road leaves the highway, just north of Heppner.
